# FARMS IN WESTERN CANADA

Now Open for Settlement  
Some of the choicest lands in the grain growing belts of Saskatchewan and Alberta have recently been opened for settlement under the Revised Homestead Regulations of Canada. Thousands of homesteads of 160 acres each are now available. The new regulations make it possible for entry to be made by proxy, the opportunity that many in the United States have been waiting for. Any member of a family may make entry for any other member of the family who may be entitled to make entry for himself or herself. Entry may now be made before the Agent or Sub-Agent of the District by proxy for certain conditions by the father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of an intending homesteader.

Any even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba or the North-West Provinces, excepting 8 and 26, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person the sole head of a family, or made over to him or her, to the extent of one-quarter section, of 160 acres, more or less. The fee in each case will be \$10.00. Clusters, schools and markets convenient. Healthy climate. Good crops and good laws. Grain growing and cattle raising profitable industries. # Archbishop Harty.

Archbishop Harty, of Manila, who has been the Catholic head of the church in the Philippines for four years, says of the natives: "English is to be the language of the islands. Even the Spanish priests, even the most venerable, are learning it. Popular education was fairly well provided for before the American occupation; but the American government has greatly improved the primary school system, and has done a vast deal of good by impressing on the natives the dignity of labor. The people are of good intellectual capacity. They remain deeply religious. Parental authority is piously respected. The home life is pure and attractive. It would be more than a mistake to abandon the islands. It would be nothing short of a burning disgrace, it would be a shame. The brightest page in American history will be that recording the operations of this government in the Philippines. My belief is that in time the Philippines may turn Japan to Christianity. These Philippines are the pearl of the Orient. Just think—six million Christians in, we may say, the heart of Asia! I believe that the Philippines will finally convert the Japanese, and the Japanese will in turn convert the rest of Asia."

The only danger to the country now is from professional revolutionists, who if not repressed would be bloody anarchists. The best element of the Philippines respect and admire the United States.

Smelting Steel by Electricity. "The enormous quantity of iron ore which is being scooped from the ranges about Lake Superior, dug out of the hills of Alabama and Tennessee and hoisted from the deep pits of Pennsylvania, has caused the geologist and mineralogist to make startling predictions. Some of them have gone so far as to say that we are approaching an era when iron may rank among the rarer metals because of its scarcity. Even James J. Hill, the railroad magnate and developer of the Northwest, who was one of the first to realize the vast deposits of ore in the Superior ranges, has made the prophecy that perhaps within a half century most of the richer ore beds will be exhausted and that we may be obliged to go outside of America for much of the raw material for our smelters and furnaces."—Technical World Magazine.

# CHRONOSCOPE READS THE MIND.



# MACHINE WHICH LAYS BARE INNERMOST THOUGHTS.

Startling revelations have been made of the secret tests applied to Harry Orchard, the self-confessed multi-murderer and chief witness at the trial of William D. Haywood at Boise, Idaho, by Prof. Hugo Munsterberg, of Harvard. The disclosures are contained in an article by Prof. Munsterberg in McClure's Magazine.

The Harvard professor of psychology probed to the very recesses of the convict's brain, and used for his startling researches perhaps the most remarkable scientific instrument ever devised—the chronoscope.

The use of this instrument on an actual criminal in connection with a murder trial marks an epoch in legal history, the final developments of which may substitute this mute, inexorable revealer of the inside of a man's or a woman's brain for Judge, jury, district attorney and police inquisitor alike.

Imagine the use to which the perfected chronoscope will be put—indeed, can not be put. Suppose the suspect arrested in some mysterious murder, like the Tavshanjan crime. No police "third degree," but an absolutely certain decision, by the application of the chronoscope, will declare whether or not the man is guilty.

The prisoner is told to speak, in reply, the first word that comes to his mind in response. The time this takes is recorded on the dial. If the prisoner refuses to speak it is a confession of guilt. If he replies his guilt or innocence can be surely proven. For other words follow, and the time of the answering ideas is taken. Then when nailed on heavy strings, laid close together. There were five tollgates, with a tariff rate of a cent a head for stock, 5 cents for a man on horseback and 10 cents if he traveled in a vehicle. A footman paid the same as other animals—1 cent.

There was a keeper at each tollgate, and his job with the road company, to gether with a cottage and garden donated for his use, made him a fair living. His rake-off on the tolls was 20 per cent.

Work on the plank road was begun in April, 1853, and the last spike was driven in October, 1854. It was a gigantic enterprise for that day and the people thought it solved the transportation problem for all time. They didn't dream that within four or five years steam engines would be evicting around in these parts and that the bulk of business would sweep by regardless of the river.

Flight of the Butterflies. One of the most beautiful sights in the world is the annual migration of butterflies across the isthmus of Panama. Where they come from or whether they go no one knows, and though many distinguished naturalists have attempted to solve the problem it is still as strange a mystery as it was to the first European traveler who observed it. Toward the end of June a few scattered specimens are discovered fitting out to sea, and as the days go by the number increases until about July 14 or 15 the sky is occasionally almost obscured by myriads of these frail insects.

# The Chinese Army.

"Soldiers used to be despised in China and only the coolies were considered suitable material for fighting men," says Owen Macdonald in the editorial World Magazine. "To-day all is changed, and China has an army to which it is an honor to belong. Outfits have been superseded by wireless telegraphic apparatus and signal balloons; musk has given place to field glasses, comic opera garb has been cast off for khaki uniforms and the two-handed sword has become the bayonet. China was first aroused to a sense of her weakness, and her strength, by the disaster of the war with Japan in 1894. Hitherto she had slumbered like a great lazy giant, smiling scornfully at the suggestion that smaller and weaker nations, by adopting modern methods, might insure her. She had sublime faith in the force of the vast hordes she could 'hrow into the field.'"
