The sad news was telegraphed from Goodrich, N D, to John W Hazelgrove last Saturday, December 26, 1908, that Mrs Hiram Gray had died that morning at the home of her daughter, Mrs A Hendrix, of cancer of the stomach, from which disease she had been a sufferer for several years.

Francis E Hazelgrove was born in Dakota county, Nebr, September 15, 1863; was married September 27, 1882, to Hiram Gray. She made this county her home until about six years ago when the family moved to Denhoff, N D, and lived on a homestead, and proved up during the past year.

A sorrowing husband and four children are left to mourn her departure. The children are—Mrs Nellie Hendrix, Harry, Charley and Frank Gray.

During her long residence here the deceased was prominent in social life, and was an active church worker. She was a member of the Modern Brotherhood of America lodge, in which she carried a policy of \$1,000.

The funeral was held from her home in Denhoff, N D, the date and place of burial was not learned up to the hour of going to press.

The many Dakota county friends of the family, where the deceased was born, grew to womanhood, attended school and mingled in society, deeply sympathize with them in the loss of a noble wife and loving mother who has gone to that better world where suffering and sorrow are no more.
