Army of Baseball Recruits Promises to Grow Old Timers Out.

SOB PITCHERS ARE AGING.

Several Youngsters in Line to Take Jobs on Regular Staff—Detroit Has Many Veterans, and So Have Pirates. Few Old Timers on Red Sox.

Breakers slowly for the major league "vets!" Ahead but surely the old timers hailed a few seasons ago among the truly greats are slipping, and popular demand for new faces, coupled with the degeneration of those same old idols, is working tremendous changes in both circuits. The time honored adage, "It isn't what you were; it's what you are today," is working overtime, and the season of gloom is on in full blast.

If young talent is to be injected into the battered ranks the process will be applied locally to the hurling staff.

To take it from Chance, the infield—one of the greatest ever assembled under one roof—will endure another season, all slams at the faithful Zimmerman and youngster Doyle are hot after his job. The outfield will "come back," and it looks like Sheppard, Schulte and Hoffman for the one best bet. Kilg is getting up in years, as is Needham, but Archer is still a sprightly youth, and the P. L. is banking on no changes in the wind pad department.

BLACK HAND KILLS VICTIM 36

Workman Erained With Iron Rod When He Leaves Fellows.

Chicago, March 28.—A Black Hand assassin struck down victim thirty-six. His name is Dominic Coel and he lived in South Chicago. The crime was committed with an iron rod.

While the South Chicago police were busy trying to learn the identity of the victim killed on Saturday, and while secret agents of the federal government were working to trace the sender of a threatening letter received by Judge Landis, and while twenty or more detectives were trying to find the assassins who shot and wounded Anthony Bardinana, the Black Hand—as if to display its contempt for its enemies—killed its latest victim almost within sight of fifty fellow workmen.

Coel was working near a furnace at the Federal Furnace company. He walked to the rear of the furnace to attend to some work about 1 o'clock in the morning. He failed to return, and fellow workmen went in search of him. They found him lying beside the furnace. His skull was crushed. Nearby lay the blood stained iron rod which had been used as a weapon.

GOLDEN JUBILEE OF ITALY

MADERO PLEASSED

Insurrecto President Believes Battle is Nearly Won.

WANT REFORMS, NOT PROMISES

Fighting Will Not Cease Until Diaz Has Been Replaced—Suffering Among Noncombatants Along Border Is Growing Worse.

Mexico City, March 28.—President Diaz' cabinet was officially announced as forecasted. Cosio is named minister of war. The post of minister of the interior is not filled. The inaugural ceremonies will occur today.

El Paso, Tex., March 28.—Couriers who left Madero's camp several days ago, when the insurrecto leader was about sixty miles north of Chihuahua, reported to the junta here that Madero was enthusiastic over the condition of the insurrectos.

At that time Madero had not heard of the resignation of the Diaz cabinet. The couriers reported, however, that Madero had repeated his declaration that the insurrection would not cease until Diaz had been replaced and reforms had been accomplished rather than promised.

From the interior of northern Mexico come reports that suffering among the non-combatants is growing worse. The order of the insurrectos that no road shall be taken into the small towns from the surrounding country is working a hardship on the people who are held practically under siege.
