MAINE REDUCED TO SHELL

Iron Work Shattered by Explosion or Corroded.

Havana, June 17.—A greatly increased area of the wreck of the battleship Maine was exposed to view when the water level within the cofferdam had been lowered to a total of ten and a half feet below normal.

Everywhere the iron work exposed, if not shattered by the explosion, has been so corroded as to be reduced to a mere shell, making it highly probable that the plan to repair and float any part of the ship must be abandoned.

Iowan Finds Gold on Farm.

Mason City, Ia., June 20.—J. J. Lacey, a farmer living near Garner, is showing a certificate received from an assayer to the effect that gold discovered on his farm some time ago assays \$83 a ton. The extent of the vein is not known.

Revolution in Portugal.

Madrid, June 16.—Telegrams from Vigo state that a monarchist revolution has broken out at Chaves, Portugal, and that the Portuguese garrison mutinied and killed its commander.
