Lincoln, June 16 .- Some of the colored people of Lincoln object to the use of the body of Thomas Johnson se a subject for a private demonstration in embalming before the Nebrasks State Funeral Directors' association. Johnson was hanged at the penitentiary for murder, and as he was without funds his body was taken charge of by Major Moore and other colored people of Lincoln, who promised to give it proper burial. Otherwise the body would have to be sent to a medical college for dissection. The body will be used for a private demonstration in embalming and will then be buried by the State Funeral Directors' association.
