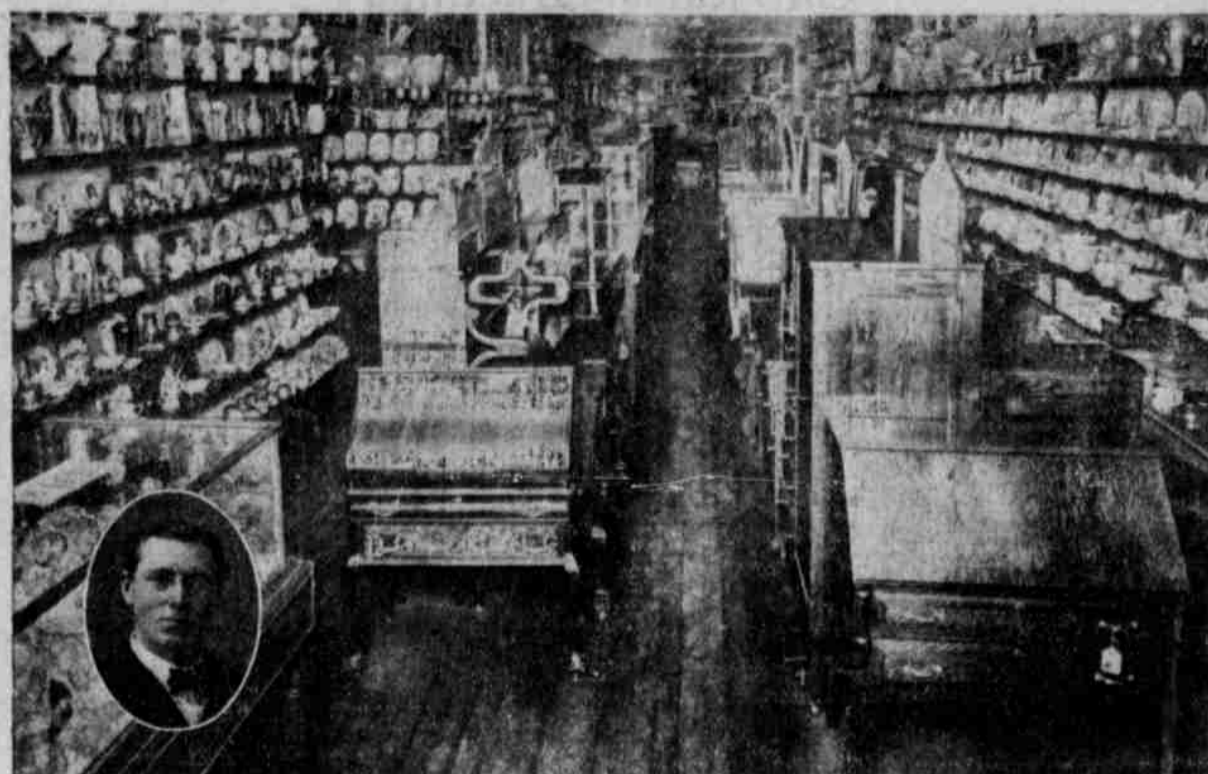
SUPPLIES BAPTIST PULPIT
