

C., B. & Q. HURLED INTO ETERNITY

Track Workman Meets Instant Death While on Way to Visit Friends

Last Sunday morning, at 10:30, as extra freight, 20-40, westbound, was within 'wo miles east of Reno, Engineer Rhody Deitlien observed a man on a three-wheel car, going in the same direction with the train. The distance between the two was testified by the train crew as being about a quarter of a mile. Deitlien blew the whistle repeatedly, but the man ahead paid no attention to it. When the space between the two narrowed down to within several hundred feet, the engineer again sounded a danger warning by means of the shrill whistle and immediately applied the air. The man on the car turned around and leisurely looked at the train. Then he tempted to draw the car from the track, but some obstacle obstructed his efforts, when he withdrew from the track, but immediately went back and made a second attempt to push the car from the rails. But it was too late. The engine bore down upon him, hurling him from the track. The train was stopped and within a car's length of the way car the body of the unfortunate man was found by Conductor Kenner. An examination of the effects in deceased's pockets showed a postal card addressed to Rosario Augruso, Lakeside, Nebr. Later investigation disclosed the fact that the dead man was an Italian track employee between Lakeside and Reno, and was on his way to the latter place to spend the day at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Berry.

The remains were brought to this city by the train crew, and an inquest held at the Darling undertaking parlors, at 4 p. m. Sunday. The jury, composed of Geo. Gaddis, Earl Reed, Gregory Zurn, J. B. Kniest, Geo. Leidy and L. A. Berry, on ex amination of the witnesses brought in a verdict of accidental death, with no blame attached to said crew. all of whom gave practically the same evidence.
