Pugsley Advises Rolling of Ground.

Omaha, April 23.—Farmers of Nebraska, who have planted winter wheat and which is affected by the cracking of the ground should not be too fast to plow it under, says Professor C. W. Pugsley of the Nebraska experiment station. Professor Pugsley has authorized the publicity bureau of the Commercial club to spread the information throughout the state that the condition of the ground is not as critical as some might think. However, he advises the rolling of the ground with a corrugated roller, if possible.


Real Estate Values Cannot Be Changed after Meeting of Board of Equalization

A WOMAN'S PREMONITION

Well Known Box Butte County Citizen Warned by Daughter to not Sail on Titanic

MRS. SHEPHERD WARNS FATHER

The shipwreck of the Titanic has a direct interest to many parts of the country because of persons who were on the gigantic ocean steamer, or narrowly escaped being among the unfortunates who were on it. The following dispatch from Hemingford to the Omaha Bee shows how near a Box Butte county citizen came to being one of the victims:

Hemingford, Neb., April 19.—A most remarkable premonition of the fate of the steamship Titanic developed here today when it became known that Mrs. B. O. Shepherd, wife of a well known business man, warned her father, John Sampy, not to return on this vessel. Mr. Sampy, who had been visiting his old home in Ireland for the last nine months, wrote in February that he intended to return on the Titanic. Mrs. Shepherd immediately replied and asked him not to do so. Not being able to reason why she should make this request he paid no attention to it, but mentioned as a satisfying excuse to her that he wanted the experience of riding on the biggest vessel afloat.

This information had not the desired result, for Mrs. Shepherd again asked him to refrain from taking the Titanic. But as serious as his daughter seemed to be he could not bring himself to her way of thinking, passing it off as a peculiar whim, and immediately buying tickets on the ill-fated ship. He advised Mrs. Shepherd and added that he would still have time to receive one more letter from her before he sailed if she would be prompt in replying.

This she was, as she was in like degree insistent that he not make the trip on this vessel. So successful was she in the third and last appeal that he had his ticket exchanged, which he was enabled to do because of the Titanic being delayed several days.

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
