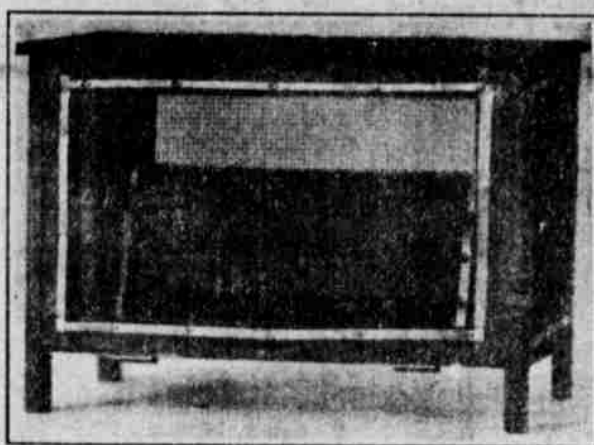
Alliance Man's Invention Disposes of Fly Pest Faster and More Thoroughly than Any Other Method

But it remained for an Alliance man to invent at an opportune time an instrument that will dispose of them by the thousands and even by the millions. That man is W. J. Hamilton, proprietor of the Fair Store. The invention is Hamilton's Triple Fly Trap, patented May 28, 1912. The success of this trap was demonstrated last year, being used at St. Joseph's Hospital, St. Agnes Academy, and by Alliance business men.

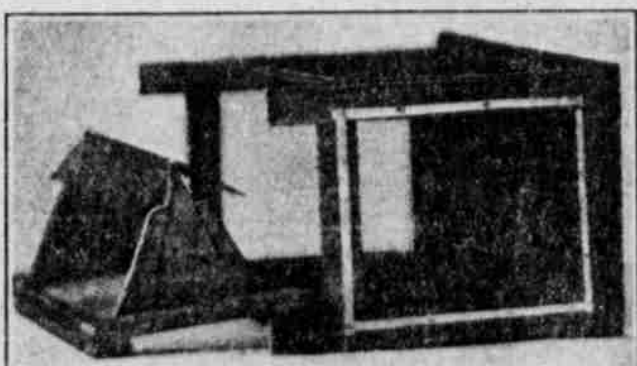
We give herewith two photo cuts of the trap, as well as a cut of the inventor. The improvement of this trap over the ordinary fly trap is much greater than appears at first thought. The ordinary conical trap has room for only one fly to enter at one time. A five inch trap of

this pattern has three entrances, and each five inches long, giving this small size fifteen inches of trap capacity.

We might say much more in commendation of this useful invention, but the best thing about it is that it does the work. Those who saw it used last fly season, and just after it had been invented, and even before it had been perfected, were convinced that its general use in any community would abate the fly nuisance.

At a meeting of the Alliance city council, held last Tuesday night, Hamilton's Triple Fly Trap was approved for use in the school buildings and other public buildings and places.

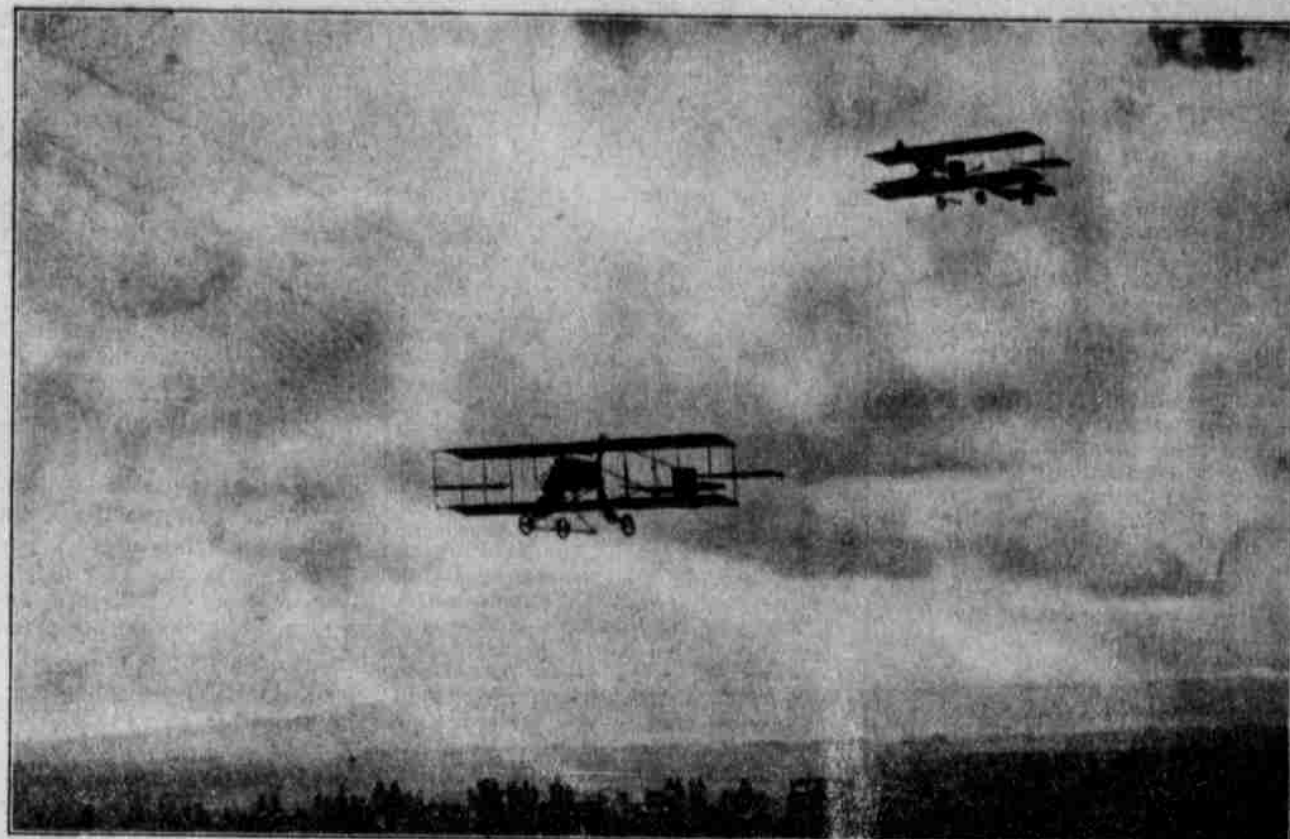
K. J. Stern, wife and little son spent Sunday in Lincoln visiting with Mrs. Robt. Meyers, sister of Mr. Stern.
