LIVE STOCK PRICES AT SOUTH OMAHA

Beef Steers About Steady and Cow Stuff Sells Lower.

HOGS STEADY TO A NICKEL OFF

Sheep Supplies Comparatively Light. Market in Pretty Good Shape—California and Oregon Spring Lambs Bought \$7.50@7.75—Iowa Lambs, \$8.00.

Union Stock Yards, South Omaha, June 24.—Cattle receipts were somewhat larger than on the previous Monday, but still rather small for this time of the year. About 3,300 cattle arrived and only a limited number were good enough for beef. Fat cattle ruled fully steady with best calves at \$9.00. Cows and heifers were 40¢ to 50¢ lower than last Thursday and slow at that. Quite a few stockers and feeders changed hands and at steady prices all around.

Quotations on cattle: Choice to prime heaves, \$9.00@9.25; good to choice heaves, \$8.50@9.00; fair to good heaves, \$8.00@8.50; common to fair heaves, \$6.50@7.85; good to choice heifers, \$6.25@7.00; good to choice cows, \$7.50@8.50; fair to good grades, \$4.20@5.40; canners and cutters, \$2.50@4.20; veal calves, \$4.50@8.00; bulls, stags, etc., \$4.00@7.00; choice to prime feeders, \$6.25@7.00; good to choice feeders, \$5.20@6.25; fair to good feeders, \$4.25@4.75; stock cows and heifers, \$3.75@5.25.

The run of hogs was very liberal, nearly 9,000 head, and this created a somewhat easier tone to the trade, although in the main prices were on a par with Saturday's sales. The close was very weak, however, and about a nickel lower. Tops brought \$7.60, the same as on Saturday, and the bulk sold at \$7.40@7.50, as against \$7.40@7.55 Saturday. Prices were fully 30¢ higher than they were on the previous Monday.

Quite a few sheep and lambs were received and the market presented no new features, prices ruling about steady and the movement being reasonably active throughout.

CONDENSED NEWS

Wilbur Wright, the noted aviator died of typhoid fever at Dayton, O.

Hampton's magazine has suspended publication and the June number will not be issued.

Underwood reintroduced in the house the cotton tariff bill, vetoed during the extra session.

Denmark has decided to have fitting representation at the Pacific-Panama exposition. A Danish building will be erected.

One entire business block of Minocqua, Wis., was destroyed by fire, the loss being about \$100,000. Lakeside hotel was among the buildings destroyed.

O. T. Kirtley, his wife, daughter and Crandall King were drowned when a skiff in which they were crossing the Mississippi river at Hannibal, Mo., capsized.

Charles Wiles' neck was broken and his mother, Mrs. Charles Schermerhorn, was severely injured when their automobile turned turtle near Holcomb, Ill.

To decide whether it will allow smoking on the street cars in Kansas City, the Metropolitan Street Railway company began asking votes of all paying passengers.

Andrew Perrault, a real "son of the American revolution," died at Galena, Ill., aged ninety-one years. His father enlisted in Washington's army when only sixteen years old.

The powder house at the Federal Lead and Zinc Mining company plant between Hazel-Green, Wis., and Galena, Ill., blew up and Harry Stevenson of Savannah was killed.

Several shoos, fired from the Dearborn street viaduct, Chicago, at non-union freight handlers at work for the Northwestern railroad, resulted in the arrest of Charles K. Stenford.

"Pension hysteria" is the latest German disease. Professor Bernhard declares it is alarmingly prevalent and the cause is too much paternal legislation.

The house will not act on the constitutional amendment for direct election of senators until the postoffice appropriation bill now before it has been disposed of.

Inquiry into rates on wheat and flour charged by western railroads began in Chicago before Special Examiner G. L. Boyle of the interstate commerce commission.

Two hundred and fifty residents of Sing Sing prison went on a strike, declaring they were not given enough to eat. The bill of fare was changed and the men returned to work.

Each of the 485 incorporated towns of Kansas has been asked by the state board of health to enact a drastic anti-fly ordinance at town meetings to be held the first week of May.

Edward Hicks, who declared there is no honest lawyer in the world, and argued his own motion for a new trial, after being convicted of murder at Chicago, was sentenced to life imprisonment.

COMMERCE COURT HIT

Supreme Court Upholds Interstate Commerce Commission.
Declaring that the commerce court was not to substitute itself for the interstate commerce commission, the supreme court of the United States in decision after decision reversed the commerce court and upheld the interstate commerce commission. The principal decisions were announced by Chief Justice White and concurred in by the entire court.
Jurisdiction of the commerce court over complaints of shippers denied by the interstate commerce commission, as well as over those recognized by the commission through affirmative orders for relief, was denied by the supreme court.

TRIES TO KILL COUNT TISZA

Deputy Fires Three Shots at Speaker of Hungarian House.
Count Tisza, president of the lower house of the Hungarian parliament, had a narrow escape from assassination in the diet. He was fired upon three times by Deputy Julius Kavacs, who then shot himself, probably with fatal effect. Count Tisza was unscratched.
Kavacs was one of the most militant members of the opposition and was among those who were ejected from the chamber Wednesday because of disorderly conduct.
Soon after the proceedings opened Kavacs moved to the front of the gallery and shouting "There are still opposition members in the chamber," drew a revolver and emptied three chambers in the direction of the president. Then seemingly chagrined at his bad marksmanship, he put two bullets into his own body.
