CUMMERCE COURT HIT

Supreme Court Upholds Interstate

Commerce Commission, Declaring that the commerce court was not to substitute itself for the interstate commerce commission, the supreme court of the United States in decision after decision reversed the commerce court and upheld the interstate commerce commission. The principal decisions were annuanced by Chief Justice White and concurred

in by the entire court. Jurisdiction of the commerce court over complaints of shippers denied by the interstate commerce commission, as well as over those recognized by the commission through affirmative orders for relief, was denied by the sunteme court.

The supreme court reversed the PRAYER MEETINGS commerce court's decision which would have allowed railroads to carry railroad coal at lower rates than commercial coal. The interstate commerce commission was upheld.
