BUSY BUILDING SEASON

Prospects That 1913 Will Lead All
Previous Years in Building in
Northwestern Nebraska

ALLIANCE WILL LEAD

An optimistic spirit prevails among business men and people generally in this part of the west. In Alliance it is believed that the year 1913 will be one of the best for business in the history of the city. It is already evident that building operations will be extensive.

Work is now in progress clearing away the debris of the old Central school house, preparatory to erecting the new building, which when completed will be one of the finest public buildings in this end of the state and will not be excelled by any other in its adaptability to school purposes.

The house will be 30x30, two stories, and will cost about \$3,000.
