## RAILWAY BUSINESS FOR MAY

During May the railways of the United States received for their services to the public an average of \$82,000,000 a day; it cost to run their trains and for other expenses of operation \$5,920,000 a day; their taxes were \$341,500 a day; their operating income \$1,972,322 a day for the 229,897 miles of line reporting, or at the rate of \$8.93 for each mile of line for each day. Thus for every six dollars of their earnings which remained available for rentals, interest on bonds, appropriations for betterments, improvements and new construction, and for dividends, the railways had to pay more than one dollar in taxes.

All of these amounts are substantially greater than the similar returns for May, 1912. They are from the summary of the earnings and expenses compiled by the Bureau of Railway Economics from the monthly reports of the steam railways of the United States to the Interstate Commerce Commission. They include over 15 per cent of the mileage and earnings of all of the railways of the country.
