OHIO G. O. P. CONFERENCE

Ohio Republicans Meet Tomorrow in Great Get-Together Meeting at Columbus

Columbus, O., Feb. 25—Arrangements have been concluded for the get-together conference of Ohio republicans to be held here tomorrow and for the banquet which will be a feature of the gathering. Prominent republican leaders who have already arrived in the city agree that the conference will have important results with relation to the future of the party and its success in the coming state campaign. A last effort will be made to bring about a reconciliation with the progressives. Some of the republican leaders profess a hope that the attempt to bring the progressives back into the republican fold will succeed, notwithstanding the fact that the progressives already have agreed upon candidates for United States senator and governor and have otherwise manifested their determination to go it alone. Several prominent progressive leaders, however, have accepted the invitation to attend the republican conference and this has fostered the hope that a reconciliation may be accomplished. As the principal argu-

ment in favor of a reconciliation the republican leaders will emphasize their belief that with three party tickets in the field the re-election of Governor Cox and the success of the whole democratic ticket will be assured.

The meeting is to be held under the auspices of the Republican State central committee. It has been heralded as a get-together function in the broadest sense of the term. The republicans of the dyed-in-the-wool, regular variety, will mingle on the same platform with state leaders who were prominent in the management of the Roosevelt campaign in the last presidential contest. Senator Borah of Idaho, who delivered a notable speech in New York Lincoln's birthday on "The Republican Party" will be the speaker to discuss national issues. Former Senator D. M. Massie of Chillicothe, who was chairman of the literary bureau of the progressive party in the 1912 campaign in Ohio, will be the main speaker on state issues.
