POLITICS AND POLITICIANS

Thirty-one states are to elect governors this year.

Five candidates are contesting for the governorship in Alabama.

Three hundred cities and towns of Illinois are to vote on the liquor question next month.

The Republican state ticket in Maine will be selected at a convention to be held in Augusta, April 9.

On April 7 the voters of New York will decide whether a convention shall be held to frame a new state constitution.

Twenty-three amendments, initiative and referendum measures will be voted on at the California election in November.

Congressman J. Thomas Hefflin is the only Alabama representative who has no opposition for re-election in the primaries next month.

A special election will be held in the Seventh district of New Jersey on April 7 to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Congressman Brenner.

Former Governor Myron T. Herrick, now ambassador at Paris, is mentioned as a possible candidate for governor of Ohio on the Republican ticket this year.

Lieutenant Governor Barratt O'Hara of Illinois is a candidate for the Democratic nomination for United States senator to succeed Lawrence Y. Sherman, Republican.

Socialists of North Dakota met in Grand Forks recently and nominated a full state ticket to be submitted to the voters at the general primaries to be held in June.

A. Caminetti, United States Commissioner General of Immigration, may decide to enter the contest for the Democratic nomination for governor of California.

Representative C. O. Lobeck may be opposed for the Democratic nomination in the Second congressional district of Nebraska by James C. Dahlman, the mayor of Omaha.

Michigan Democrats will renominate Governor Woodbridge N. Ferris, who is the first representative of their party to occupy the executive office in more than twenty years.

It is reported that the purpose of Theodore Douglas Robinson in going to Europe is to meet Col. Roosevelt and consult with him concerning the political situation in New York. Mr. Robinson is a nephew of the former president and chairman of the New York Progressive state committee.

Two candidates are in the field for the Republican nomination for governor of Michigan this year. They are Alexander J. Groesbeck, chairman of the state committee, and F. C. Martindale, present secretary of state and a defeated candidate for the gubernatorial nomination two years ago.

Jeremiah D. Botkin, warden of the Kansas State Penitentiary, is a candidate for the United States senate on the Democratic ticket. Senator Bristow seeks re-election and Charles Curtis, former senator, is contesting with him for the Republican nomination. Congressman Victor Murdock of the Eighth district is the choice of the Progressive party for the senatorship.

THE SOLUTION OF A DIFFICULT PROBLEM

The solution of a difficult problem in Alliance seems to be in sight. What to do with the colored population of the city has been a serious question. With petty gambling and other unlawful doings, resulting in an occasional shooting affair, disgrace has been brought unjustly upon the respectable negroes as well as the others, and the city as a whole given an undesirable reputation among some people who are not familiar with all the facts.

In an earnest effort to correct the evils that have existed among the colored population of this city, arrests have been made and fines assessed, a special officer being appointed to this particular work, and yet the evils have been only partly remedied. Some have said that the town ought to be cleaned up by running the negroes all out; but this proposition is so manifestly unfair that not many white people will entertain it. Among the colored population of Alliance there are some as respectable and well behaved citizens as can be found among the white

people, here or anywhere else. Instead of adding insult and injury to the unjust burdens which they already have to bear, they should be honored and encouraged for the part they have taken in trying to improve conditions.

Now comes a solution of the problem that many seem not to have thought of, and that is the elevation of the moral condition of the colored people. The Herald has desired to see greater activity among the forces that make for the social and spiritual improvement of the race here. With due regard for what can be accomplished by law enforcement, it is very plain that desirable citizenship cannot be fully obtained until the force of moral suasion has been brought to bear upon the objects of reformation, not until right living and doing has been made a matter of conscience. With the colored people kicked and cuffed from pillar to post, and with never a word to encourage them to high ideals of citizenship, it is not to be wondered at that they "neither fear God nor regard man;" but with the encouragement that comes to them from such a movement as is now on foot in Alliance and which is mentioned in the news columns of this issue of The Herald, favorable results may be reasonably expected, such as are not possible of accomplishment by the means of fines and prison bars.
