## LIVE STOCK PRICES AT SOUTH OMAHA

Best Cattle Strong and Common Kinds Slow.

HOGS SUFFER 5-10% DECLINE

Really No Change in Ewes and Lambs. Movement is Fairly Active—Good Demand For Feeders and Prices Steady to Strong.

Union Stock Yards, South Omaha, Oct. 5.—A heavy run of cattle arrived today, some 11,000 head. The market for corned cattle presented no new features today and was normally in pretty much the same condition as last week. Trade in western grass cattle was in very fair shape from the sellers' point of view. Desirable stock of all kinds was in good request, at steady to strong prices. Medium and common kinds were slow sale at shaded figures. Cows and heifers were not so eagerly sought after as they were two or three weeks ago, but prices generally averaged about steady with last week's decline. In stockers and feeders the trade was reasonably brisk as far as the good to choice grades were concerned and prices steady to strong, but on the fair to poor kinds it was a slow, dragging deal all day and in some cases dealers thought they had to shade prices a little. In the main, it was a good, strong market for anything attractive and a slow and weak trade on medium and common stuff of all kinds.

Cattle quotations: Good to choice beefs, \$8.50@10.50; fair to good beefs, \$5.50@9.50; common to fair beefs, \$7.75@8.50; good to choice heifers, \$6.50@7.50; good to choice cows, \$6.00@6.75; fair to good cows, \$5.50@6.00; canners and cutters, \$4.00@5.25; veal calves, \$8.00@10.50; bulls, stags, etc., \$5.25@7.00; prime feeding steers, \$8.20@8.40; good to choice feeders, \$7.50@8.10; fair to good feeders, \$6.75@7.25; common to fair feeders, \$6.00@6.60; stock heifers, \$5.50@6.75; stock cows, \$4.50@6.00; stock calves, \$5.50@8.00; choice to prime beefs, \$8.00@8.60; good to choice range beefs, \$7.40@8.00; fair to good beefs, \$6.75@7.25; common to fair beefs, \$6.00@6.65.

Some 4,300 hogs showed up today. Trade was more or less draggy all day and values suffered a decline of 5@10¢ as compared with last Saturday. Other markets reported dull and weakened prices. Bulk of the sales was made around \$7.75@7.85, and tops reached \$8.10, just a dime higher than Saturday's high price.

Sheep and lamb receipts totaled 35,000 head. A fairly lively market, with prices generally steady on fat ewes and lambs, opened the week today. Best lambs brought \$7.35. Outside markets reported slow trade and an easier tendency to prices. There was an active demand for all kinds of feeders at steady to strong prices.
