## ARRIVED FOR WIDOW'S BURIAL

Relative of Woman Who Died Suddenly of Heart Failure Arrived Wednesday for Body

Arthur Keefer of 122 East 42nd street, Chicago, arrived Wednesday for the burial of Mrs. Carrie F. Swan, the widow woman who died suddenly from heart failure in Alliance on Wednesday of last week. Mr. Keefer is the husband of Mrs. Marjorie Keefer, a cousin of the dead woman.

Sheriff Cal Cox and County Attorney Lee Bayse, who spent much time in hunting up the relatives of the dead woman, sent telegrams to nearly every part of the United States before they finally found any trace of relatives. Hundreds of letters from friends were found but nothing regarding relatives until an envelope was found on which was written, in her handwriting, the addresses of Mrs. Marjorie Keefer, Chicago, the cousin, and a brother, James R. Keefer of 4319 Superior street, Cleveland, Ohio. The brother, in answer to a telegram, wired back asking that the body be held and stating that a letter was on the way.

Mrs. Swan's former minister, a retired Christian church pastor at Parsons, Kansas, named J. M. Kersey, wired regarding her claim twenty miles from Van Tassel, Wyoming. Elmer E. Lesh, of Glen, Nebr., her bondsman with the Endless Tie Com-

pany of Kansas City, Missouri, wired from Lander, Wyo., stating that he did not know of relatives. She had been employed by the tie company for two years. R. B. Lesh of Brooklyn, N. Y., wired that he knew her in Detroit in 1883. Her father was at one time coroner in Detroit. Mrs. Swan had kept in communication for years with friends but had never told them of her relatives. Her husband, when living, was a mining engineer and she had kept letters written by him up to the time of his death. He traveled in all parts of the United States and Mexico.

Letters which Mrs. Swan had, showed that she was a devoted worker in the Christian church.

### Street Improvement Resolution

BE IT RESOLVED by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Alliance, Nebraska, that street curbing be within thirty days from the publication of this resolution constructed at and along the sides of all the streets and avenues or parts thereof embraced within street improvement district number two of said City, and abutting on and adjacent to the following lots and parcels of land, to-wit:

- Lots 1 to 5 inclusive, Block E, Sheridan Addition, City of Alliance, Nebr.
- Lots 1 to 9 inclusive, Block 1, Second Co. Addition, City of Alliance, Nebr.
- Lots 1 to 6 inclusive, Block 10, Second Addition, City of Alliance, Nebr.
- Lots 1 to 6 inclusive, Block 5, Second Addition, City of Alliance, Nebr.
- Lots 1 to 6 inclusive, Block 1, First Addition, City of Alliance, Nebr.
- Lots 1, J. K. L. M. N. Simonson's subdivision, City of Alliance, Nebr.
- Lots 1 to 9 inclusive, Block 2, Second Co. Addition, City of Alliance, Nebr.
- Lots 7 to 12 inclusive, Block 9, Second Addition, City of Alliance, Nebr.
- Lots 7 to 12 inclusive, Block 6, Second Addition, City of Alliance, Nebr.
- Lots 7 to 12 inclusive, Block 2, First Addition, City of Alliance, Nebr.

Said street curbing to be laid in accordance with the provisions of ordinance number 200 of said City and under the regulations of the Committee of the City Council on streets and alleys.
