PERU NORMAL NOTES

The kindergarten has recently added to its equipment a complete set of the "Schoenhuts" kindergarten floor blocks—six hundred and eighty blocks in all. These were devised by Miss Patty Hill, of Columbia University, to meet the demands for large material calling into activity the child's body as whole. They are of different shapes and sizes, the largest one yard in length. Their appeal to young builders is very strong since they make possible the construction of playhouses large enough to enter and bridges strong enough for childish feet to walk across.

Quarterly reports have been mailed to parents concerning the records of students during the first quarter. A new bulletin has been published containing descriptions of the study center work, correspondence courses and short courses. The registrar will be glad to furnish these to anyone interested. Short courses will begin January 24 and continue for nine weeks. Special classes will be organized in manual training, domestic science, agriculture and commercial branches.

Prof. F. C. Smith, head of the department of manual training, was in Chicago several days last week when he attended the national conference of manual training supervisors.

Prof. F. M. Gregg spoke before the teachers' institutes in Nemaha and Humboldt on Friday and Saturday.

ALLIANCE TAKES TWO

Alliance Methodists Win Two Fast Games from Hemingford Methodists Last Saturday

The two games played in the County a Basket Ball League last Saturday night were the closest games played on the local floor this season. In each game the local teams nosed out a victory in the last half. In the first game, between the intermediate teams, the Alliance tossers started out ahead but soon lost their head and it was an even break at the end of the first half, the score standing 11 to 11.

During the second half the locals managed to hold their opponents more effectively with the result that they made only four scores while Alliance made ten. Final score, 15 to 21 in favor of Alliance. Some dis-

cussion arose at the close of the first half over the fact that the last basket for the locals was thrown after time was called by the timekeeper but before the referee's whistle blew. The point was dismissed, however, in view of the fact that the score did not change the result of the game.

The second game, that between the Juniors, was no less interesting, and even closer than the first. At the end of the first half the score stood 8 to 12 in favor of Hemingford but the local boys came back stronger in the second half with the final result of 16 to 21 in their favor. Both games were hard fought from start to finish and the local boys feel much elated over their victory. Hemingford won two games from the local Christian teams last week.
