SEVEN STATES DRY

Seven States Closed Out Saloons and Breweries at Midnight Last Friday Night

Seven states were added to the dry list at midnight last Friday night. This makes a total of nineteen dry states in the United States. The new ones added to the list are as follows: Colorado. In Colorado 1,615 saloons and twelve breweries were put

out of business. Washington. The statewide prohibition law, adopted at the election in November, 1914, went into effect. The law closed 2,612 saloons and hotel bars throughout the state, and many breweries.

Iowa. The remaining 483 saloons and sixteen breweries in the state closed because of the repeal of the Mulct law by the state legislature a year ago. Breweries capitalized at \$4,236,963 went out of business.

Oregon. 1844 saloons were clos-The manufacture or sale of any kind of intoxicating liquor is absolutely prohibited. Drug store, are not per liven to sell liquor for any purpose. Arkansas. 136 salcens went em

of business under the most stringent prohibition law in the United States. This law provides one year in the penitentiary for violation. Idaho. 200 saloons were close i

under the new prohibition law. It makes the possession of any kind of mait or spirituous liquor a crime. South Carolina. The dispensary system was put out of business. Up der this system fifteen out of fortyfour countle, operated liquor dispensaries. Private individuals may novobtain a shipment of one gallon of

liquor per month.
