Treasury Department, Supervising Architect's Office, Calls for Bids on Building

NOTICE INDICATES THAT WORK WILL SOON BEGIN

Site Cleared Several Weeks Ago and Building Can Be Finished Before Winter if Rushed

In this issue of The Herald will be found a notice from the treasury defice, of the United States government, asking for bids for the Alliance fed-eral building. This notice was received Tuesday morning by The Herald through Postmaster Robert Graham and is taken as an indication that construction work is to start very soon on the building and that it can, if the work is rushed, be completed before winter weather.

The notice for bids requires that the seale dproposals for the construction of the building, the cost of which is estimated at \$80,000, exclusive of the site, be in before 3 p. m., June
