The Geological Survey now has available for distribution its annual statement of potash salts for 1915, which also includes some simple tests to determine the presence of potash. The amount of potash salts imported for consumption into the United States during the year is given at 179,555,450 pounds, valued at \$3,765,224.

T. M. Lawler was called to Casper, Wyo., this noon by a telegram announcing the serious illness of his daughter, Mrs. Nora Walbridge.

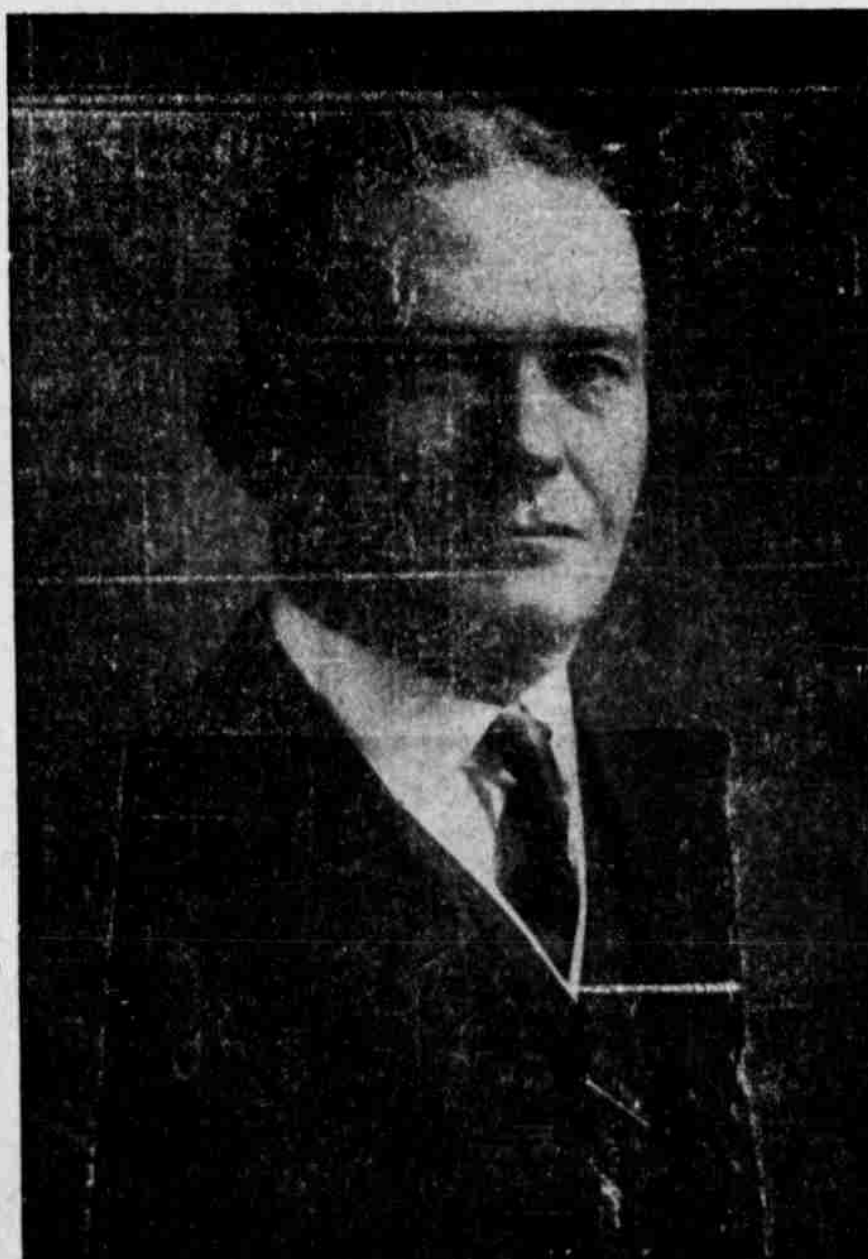
