"Bootlegging" in Colorado has been REDUCED since prohibition. Government licenses have been cut from 2500 to 103 since January according to the Internal Revenue coleletor of Colorado.

The whole state of Kansas has only 89 government licenses-less than one-half the number Omaha has over and above the regular number of saloon licenses.

Wet Nebraska has 825 saloons, and 2200 government licenses, while Kansas, with prohibition, has only 89, and dry Colorado only 103. In Omaha alone, there are 601 government licenses and 354 saloons.

Talk about "blind pigs" and prohibition! Wet Omaha has twice as many "blind pigs" as both Kansas and Colorado put together.

FURTHERMORE, Nebraska booze has put 75 per cent of teh 350 prisoners in the Nebraska penitentiary.

The saloon has been responsible for more than one-half the crime in Nebraska for the last year. Eight automobile accidents out of ten are caused by whisky.
