BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF NEBRASKA:

Section 1. A suit to collect the damages provided for by this act may be brought in any court having jurisdiction of the subject matter and parties; and if the plaintiff therein recover a judgment he shall also recover a reasonable attorney's fee for the services of his attorney in said suit, to be fixed by the court and taxed as costs in said action.

Nebraska, January 30, 1917. The week opened out with a very respectable run of cattle, 350 loads, or about 9,200 head. Vigorous competition for the choice, weighty beeves and for the best yearlings created an active market for anything in these lines. The good to choice beeves sold readily at \$10.60@11.00, and the fair to good 1,050 to 1,300-pound beeves went largely around \$10.00@10.50. The run of hogs here for Monday ing out 134 cars, or 9,500 head. Shippers took about their usual share, buying mainly the good lights and butchers on a 5@10c higher basis, and packers paid fully 5@10c higher figures for the butchers and heavy kinds. were a big 5@10c higher, most of the sales landing at \$11.00@11.40. Several loads of the best heavies reached \$11.50, the top, and a new record for this market.

A liberal run of sheep and lambs showed up for Monday, receipts were estimated at 67 cars, or 16,000 head. Fat lamb trade was a little draggy at the start, but when traders got down to business it was at figures that were fully steady with the close of last celt. Early sales brought nothing over \$14.25, but quite a number of sales were made at that figure. Bulk of the desirable stuff brought \$14.00 and better.
