LIVE STOCK PRICES AT SOUTH OMAHA

Run of Sheep and Lambs is Rather Limited and Quality of the Offerings Not Very Attractive. Trade is Slow With Prices Invariably Lower for All Grades.

Union Stock Yards, South Omaha, Neb., July 17, 1917.—The week opens out with a rather light run of cattle, about 3,200 head, and a steady to strong market for desirable beef steers. Choice 1,400-pound heaves brought \$13.35 and choice yearlings \$18.25. Medium and common stock was slow sale, but not notably different from the latter part of last week. Cow stuff ruled about steady, choice grassers bringing \$9.00. Inquiry for stockers and feeders was better than recently and prices stronger.

Hogs Steady, Close Lower.
A rather liberal Monday's run of hogs showed up, about 7,800 head, and there was a very good demand from both packers and shippers. Best grades of all weights sold at steady prices early, but later the market was dull, with prices 5@10c lower than Saturday. Tops brought \$15.40 and the bulk of the trading was around \$14.65@15.00.

Muttons Steady to Lower.
With a very limited run of sheep and lambs for a Monday, about 2,300 head, the market showed little change as compared with the latter part of last week. Demand was very fair and while trade was steady to a shade lower, a good clearance was made. Some right good yearlings brought \$11.35.

With the basis of drawing fixed at two-thirds of one per cent of the total population, New York city, with an estimated population of 6,504,185 will give 43,382 of the 687,000 young men to be called on the first draft. A city with 25,000 population would be required to give 166 men. These apportionments would be subject to slight allowances for alien enemies, for men who have volunteered, and for other causes.

How Exemption is Made
A young man who believes he is entitled to an exemption from service if he is drawn in the great human lottery when the first 687,000 young men will be selected for the national army, doesn't need a lawyer to get that exemption or appear before the board for him. It is a useless expense and won't do him any good. If he is entitled to an exemption he can get it from the board himself by following the simple directions that have been outlined by the provost marshal general's office. The procedure is simple:
1. He must learn his number. If it is drawn, he will receive notice to appear on a certain day for physical examination.
2. If he passes the examination, he has seven days in which to file a claim for exemption, if he has dependents. He has ten days more to file affidavits, and copies of all the

blanks can be had right at the exemption office of his district. If he claims exemption because of industry he can get the blanks there to pre-

sent to the district board. The boards will do the rest.

Provost Marshal General Crowder has called special attention to the provision for "absentees." If a person who is out of the city and will be out of the city for some time is drawn he waits until after the drawing and then sends an application to his home board to have his case transferred to the city in which he is living. He can take his physical examination there. That board will pass on his case and certify the result back to his home. But he must wait until he is drawn before asking for a transfer.

General Crowder has emphasized that the provisions calling upon the person who has dependents to claim an exemption and file affidavits supporting his claim did not place any bonus on the individual. The government, he said, wanted all persons who have actual dependents on their labor to present this claim—that it was their duty to do so. Failing to do so, however, he pointed out that the wife or a third party even, knowing the case, could call the board's attention to the case by filing the claim. The purpose of the government, it was explained, is not to force persons who should stay at

home into the army, but to compel every person who has no valid excuse for not going to war to serve if he was drawn.

While there was no official announcement on the detailed plans for the drawing, each number will be put into a "black capsule" and this capsule will have to be opened before it be told what number has been drawn. Military officers smile at this suggestion, but members of congress declared that this was the last move to prevent any possible chance of a charge of "favoritism" being made in drawing the numbers. The numbers for each state will not be drawn separately. One set of numbers—or probably two—will be drawn and will apply to the entire nation, a dispatch from Washington says. It has been thought that one set of numbers would fill the bill, but as the size of the lists vary widely, it is regarded as probable that the districts will be divided into two classes—those having up to a certain number of registrations; and the other class above that.
