He offered peace on the most abject and insulting terms. His demands meant more than the exaction of tribute. He over-reached himself in this; thus defenting his purpose. He not only demanded tribute money, but the surrender of that which was most vital to Ahab's manhood and self-respecthis wives and children. He thus made a thrust at his tenderest spot. Many a ninn has been thus aroused to do his du y, who otherwise would have submitted to shameful indignities.
