

EAT POTATOES AND SAVE MORE WHNAT

Miss Margaret Sherwin, Home Demonstration Agent, Tells How to Make Use of Potatoes

We have all been conserving on wheat during the past few months and yet we have fallen down in our shipments. Eating potatoes will increase the supply of wheat. We have millions of bushels that will not be good three months from now. **EAT MORE POTATOES.**

It is every true American's duty to eat potatoes and save for our men who are fighting and for the allies. A popping baked potato, a mound of creamy mashed potatoes, a rich brown potato cake, or a well seasoned stuffed potato will satisfy any normal person.

Following are some potato recipes from the food administration:

Potato Puffs

Two cups mashed potatoes
1 cup grated cheese
2 eggs
1/2 cup milk
1 teaspoonful salt.
Add milk to potatoes, beat thoroughly until blended. Add beaten egg and salt, gradually add grated cheese. Bake in greased pans.

Potato Cookies

Two cups sifted flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
2 teaspoons baking powder
3/4 cup sugar
3 tablespoons shortening
Leggwell beaten
1 cup mashed potatoes
Mix until dough is formed thick enough to roll. Cut 1-8 thick. Bake 15 minutes.

Chocolate Potato Cake

1/4 cup fat
1/2 cup sugar
3/4 cup dry riced potatoes
Legg
1/4 cup milk
1/4 teaspoon salt
1 square chocolate
3 teaspoons baking powder
3/4 cup white flour.

So eat potatoes—Save wheat and redeem our obligation to the allies.

OFFERS FREE FLOWER SEEDS

Jacksonville, Fla., April 25, 1918. —Editor Alliance Herald, Alliance, Nebraska: Have you space to allow a letter from Floriad, the so-called land of flowers. But we have had a variation this winter with a vengeance, when the ice king pounced upon us so unexpectedly and cooked our tender vegetation to a finish. And what the first freeze did not get the following one did. But gardens were replanted, the days are warm and everything looks better. In this state we plant for the summer garden in February and for the winter garden in September.

My flower garden, I always aim to have a nice one, is beginning to look fine. This year we planted an extra lot of vines, for like charity, vines cover a multitude of—unsightly objects of which this cold winter gave us a good supply. The Ipomea vine seed was used freely. It is of rapid growth, dense shade and produces such an abundance of bright red, star-shaped flowers. I have quite a lot of Ipomea seed left and any of the Herald readers who wish some of it I will mail it to you if you send postage. The way I have so much, last fall while visiting in Georgia I gathered it, as a pass time, and sure did get a lot of seed intending to give home friends, but they are now supplied.

Perhaps after all, the editor may not allow this but if the offer gets a dose of the waste basket no one will be any the wiser.

Then I have some other flower garden seeds that I will give you as long as they last. One, the beautiful Lantana. I have plenty of that seed so you can all have a few. They are a pot plant and produce handsome disc shaped flowers in all shades of red to yellow. The foliage is very aromatic. To you to whom I send Canna Lily seed, be sure and clip each seed before planting. No doubt many of the disappointments in trying to grow

this is the failure to clip the big, hard seed before planting.

Do not send any stamped envelopes. Seed may break through. Also be sure you give a plain address. Do not think that I am in any seed business, for I am not.
