

FARM BUREAU NOTES

There appears to be no shortage of help among the farmers of Box Butte county. During the past week twelve men were placed on farms through the county agent's office and more would have been placed had the work been available. Wages in the county range from \$40 to \$50 per month, depending upon a man's ability to do farm work.

Farmers who are in need of help or those who know they will be shortly should notify the county agent Those living in the northern half of the county may notify Hutton & Clark, who are assisting the farm bureau in supplying help.

About one-third of the farmers of the county have taken out books, with which to keep a record of the farm business for 1918. During these busy times care should be taken not to let the accounts run too far be-

The collector of internal revenue has ruled that the income tax may be figured from these books, showing the income accrued instead of figuring the income on a cash basis, as has been previously done. However, if this is to be done it will be necessary to keep the books up to date.
