LAWS REGULATING EMPLOYMENT OF WOMEN

Summary of Laws Relating to the Employment of Women and Children in Nebraska.

A 9-hour day—No woman shall be employed in cities of over 5,000 in any manufacturing, mechanical, or mercantile establishment, laundry, hotel or restaurant office, or by any public service corporation more than 9 hours in the day of 54 hours a week.

Hours between 6 A. M. and 10 P. M. The hours of each day may be arranged to permit employment of women at any time between 6 a. m. and 10 p. m. but not between 10 p. m. and 6 a. m., except in the case of public service corporations which may employ women between 10 p. m. and 6 a. m. But such night employment shall not be more than eight consecutive hours.

Seats must be provided for women. Every employer in stores, factories, offices and schools shall provide seats for women in his employ and shall permit the use of the seats.

Children under fourteen years shall not be employed. No child under fourteen shall be employed in an occupation or business whatever during the hours that the public schools are in session.

Children between the ages of 14 and 16 may be employed under certain conditions. The employer of children between the ages of 14 and 16 must keep on file a certificate from the school authorities attesting the age and physical fitness of such children, that they can read and write simple sentences in the English language, that they have attended school for at least three-fourths of the school year previous to arriving at the age of 14, or previous to applying for such certificate. Where a child under 16 who has not completed the eight grade is employed regular attendance at a public evening school for three evenings a week and 20 weeks in the year is required.

An 8-hour day for children and no night work. Children under 16 shall not be employed for more than eight hours a day, nor for more than 48 hours in one week, nor between 8 p. m. and 6 a. m.

CANDIDATES PLEDGED FOR RATIFICATION

W. J. Bryan Urges Voters of Nebraska to Scant Closely Records and Pledge of Candidates

Although W. J. Bryan is not now planning to take part in the Nebraska campaign this fall, he has called upon Nebraska voters who favor prohibition to scan closely the pledges and records of candidates for the legislature as to how they stand on the proposition of ratifying the national constitutional amendment.

In his statement to the public Mr. Bryan says:

"Vote only for the legislative candidates who favor ratification. Fourteen states have ratified—twenty-two more are necessary. These can be secured at the coming election if the friends of the amendment do their duty. The sentiment in favor of the amendment is overwhelming but it must be expressed at the polls to be effective.

"The voters should lay partisanship aside and vote for the dry legislative candidate against the wet candidate regardless of party. A republican legislator who will vote to ratify the national prohibition amendment is better than a democratic legislator who will vote to defeat the amendment and retain the saloons. And, of course, the reverse is also true—a dry democrat is better than a wet republican.

"Vote only for legislative candidates pledged to ratify and our fighting will be won when the polls close next November.

"The ratification fight has been won at the primaries—we only need to hold what we have already secured.

"If the nineteen dry states ratify there is no sign of failure anywhere—we only need three wet states to complete the twenty-two more needed. The returns from the primaries show that we have won in Ohio, Missouri, Minnesota, California, Vermont and Wyoming, with Florida, Nevada and Illinois still to-bear from.

In the legislative district comprising Box Butte and Sheridan counties the candidates are Lloyd C. Thomas on the Democratic ticket, running for re-election, and T. L. Briggs on the Republican ticket; Briggs has not declared himself on the question of prohibition—in fact the only thing on which he has declared himself is 'notash,' and it is very probable that a majority of the voters of the district will not support him in his efforts to grab some of the state's resources.

"Lloyd Thomas is one of the three members of the House of Representatives given the credit for the passage of Nebraska's effective prohibition law. He is also one of the members who introduced the resolution in the House this spring ratifying the national amendment. His stand on the prohibition question is well known and he is basing his campaign on his excellent record during the past two years.
