CATTLE MARKET HIGHER DE-ANDS STRONG: OUTLOOK FAVOR-ABLE.HOGS STEADY SHEEP AND LAMBS LOWER

Union Stockyards, Omaha, Nov. 14th. The gruelest war of all time is over, so far as shooting is concerned but there is much to be done before the world will reap the full benefit of the greatest victory ever gained for humanity.

All of the outbursts of joy and gratitude that have been manifested by various kinds of celebrations throughout the world, together with the prayers of thankfulness, have been fully justified and in keeping with the greatest event of all time, and November 11th should be made an International as well as a National Thanksgiving holiday.

We must not allow this success or anything else to premit us to lose our heads, become arrogant or less charitable with any one, neither should we overlook the fact that we, as a country, have even more responsibility and need for all of our faculties, calm and impartial judgment, courage and all that goes with the highest order of reconstruction, making practical all of the many high sounding and wonder ful ideals and promises.

We do not expect much progress toward the return of our Boys or to the revision of the map and Governments of the World for some months, and it will probably be another year before much can be done in growing crops or in live stock production in Europe, and therefore, feel more convinced than ever that there will be an even greater demand for our meat and fats during the coming year than ever before.




