WYOMING STOCKMEN ILL WITH INFLUENZA

Prominent Wyoming Men Catch Influenza While on Way to Omaha With Train of Live Stock

Twenty-seven Wyoming stockmen, with a total aggregate wealth of several million dollars and including a prominent politician, landed in Alliance enroute to Omaha with the Spanish influenza and with the balance expecting to be taken down with the plague. Several of the men were stricken while enroute to Alliance from the west. All were traveling in a stock train caboose and on their arrival in the city they all went to the Alliance hotel where they registered, those who were suffering being taken to the hospital where they are now being cared for.

The politician was State Senator S. Scougard of Basin. The others from Basin were E. J. Jones, F. L. Perkins, and W. R. Tolman. Those from Greybull were T. W. Olney, J. W. Poterfield, L. R. Emery, J. T. Cucus, H. Thomas, Thales Smith, Olan V. Kinder, W. W. Rhea and F. W. Ewen. J. H. Doores and H. E. Cheeseman were from Meeteetse; Fred Herron, Albert Herron and M. L. Austin were from Shell; R. M. Shepard and John P. Perkins were from Otto; R. D. Perkins and J. O. Neff from Burlington; F. E. Reed, Roundin; W. Guffney, Billings; R. Harp, Worland; J. C. Frison, Ten Sleep; and W. W. Hanson, Sheridan; Comprised the balance of the party.

Several of the men in the party, although suffering somewhat, accompanied their cattle on through to market. Others went to the hospital in Alliance and others returned to their homes in Wyoming.
