

RESOLUTIONS ADOPTED ON POTASH HIGHWAY

Road Boosters Pass Resolutions Covering Different Phases of Work for the New State Road

The work accomplished at the annual convention of the Potash Highway Association, held in Seneca on Tuesday of last week, will have lasting and beneficial effect on the completion of plans for the building of this much-needed highway through central Nebraska. The reports rendered resulted in some interesting statistics, among them being the following:

The resolutions adopted at the convention read as follows:

Resolutions Adopted

- Resolved that the work of the officers of the Potash Highway Association be fully endorsed and commended, their labors having been performed in the face of considerable opposition and from their reports and facts adduced we are firm in the belief that the Potash Highway is soon to be a reality, mostly through and by their efforts, and in appreciation thereof and therefore, they are hereby tendered the hearty thanks of this association.
- Be it further resolved: That we endorse the action of the legislature of the state of Nebraska, pertaining to the establishment of State Highways, as outlined in House Bill No. 298 and Senate File No. 68 and that we urge the enactment of these bills into laws and pledge the co-operation of this association to the carrying into effect such legislation.
- Resolved further: That the Potash Highway Association endorse legislation outlined in House Bills No. 299 and 300, which provides means for the carrying into effect legislation proposed by the bills mentioned in the preceding resolution.
- Resolved: That we learn with regret that our secretary, W. D. Fisher, has decided to leave the state, that we extend to him our best wishes and our sincere thanks for his efficient work in behalf of the Potash Highway, and further, inasmuch as Mr. Fisher has received no compensation for his labors and he has given much of his time to this movement, we recommend that he be paid the sum of \$100 the same to be paid out of the first available funds of the association.
- Be it further resolved: That we congratulate Governor McKelvie and the people of the state of Nebraska on the re-appointment of Geo. E. Johnson to the important office of state engineer of the state of Nebraska. We also thank Mr. Johnson for his many favors in the past in our behalf in assisting to establish the Potash Highway.
- Resolved further: That we extend a vote of thanks to the Mullen band for the splendid music furnished at this meeting.
- Resolved: That we recognize that this is an era of road building and that we approve of every movement seeking to better the condition of the roads of Nebraska therefore. We heartily endorse the Good Roads Association of the state.
- Be it resolved: That we extend our thanks to all the county commissioners in the different counties for their assistance in helping to promote the Potash Highway and make it a success, and for their many personal favors extended to our officers, and that we respectfully ask and urge them to give all assistance possible to the building of the Potash Highway.
