

LIVESTOCK PRICES AT SOUTH OMAHA

Cattle Generally 25-50c Lower; Run May Break Record

HOGS SLOW 10-25c LOWER

Top \$20.50.—Sheep Run Heavy, Feeding Lambs Steady But Killers Weak to 25c Lower.—Old Sheep Steady. Union Stock Yards, South Omaha, August 28.—The week opens out with a record breaking run of about 25,000 cattle and they sold slowly at prices 25 to 50c lower than the close of last week. Best corn fed heaves brought \$17.50 and best grass heaves \$15.00. Cows and heifers and stockers and feeders showed about the same decline as the beef steers.

Hogs Sell 15@25c Lower. A light run of hogs showed up, about 4,200 head, but demand lacked urgency and trade was slow with prices around 15@25c lower than Saturday. Best butcher hogs brought \$20.50 and bulk of the trading was at \$19.50@20.00. Sheep Steady to Lower.

There was a heavy run of sheep and lambs, about 60,000 head, and while fat lambs ruled slow to 25c lower the market held steady on aged sheep as well as on feeder lambs. Best fat lambs brought \$16.75 and best feeder lambs \$15.40.

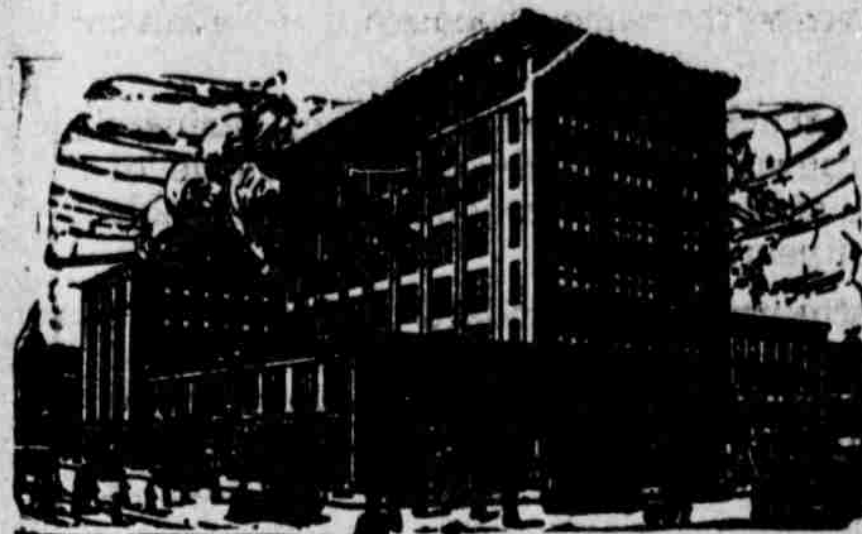
