Fireman Thomas was transferred to the hill at Ardmore.

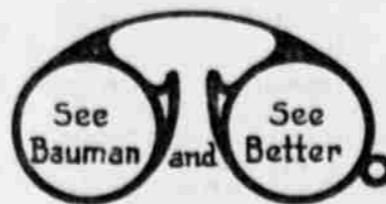
SLACK SALE POSTPONED
