

## RAILROAD MEN DRAW NEW OVERTIME RATE

Last Saturday local railroad men drew the new overtime rate for the first time. The rate, which went into effect December 1, provides that all conductors and trainmen in pool freights and in unassigned service, held at other than home terminals, will be paid continuous time after sixteen hours for each eight out of twenty-four hours. This rule applies to enginemen as well.

Terminal delays will be dispensed with but time will begin for the trip when called for duty. This ruling will add a considerable bonus to the railroad man's income.

## GET READY FOR YOUR INCOME TAX REPORT

Taxpayers Advised to Act Promptly and Prepare Their Figures in Advance.

Income tax returns are due January 1, 1920. The last date of filing will be March 15, 1920. Blanks for making returns will be mailed before January 1st to every individual, partnership and corporation that filed a return for the year 1919, so all will have ample time in which to file complete return within the time prescribed by law.

Those required to file returns should compile their figures immediately on the close of business December 31, while the transactions of 1919 are all fresh in mind. It will save time for you and all concerned.

Representatives of the Internal Revenue Department will visit all towns, where the number of returns filed warrants doing so, to assist taxpayers in making returns. There will be but one visit to each place and no return. Taxpayers are urged to avail themselves of this service. Watch the newspapers for announcement of when the Income tax man will be at your nearest town. He will be there only on the dates announced.

We will begin this service promptly on the morning of January 2, 1920. Your town may be the first on the list, so be prepared.

Every single person whose net income is \$1,000 and every married person whose net income is \$2,000 must make an income tax return. There are penalties for failure to do so.

Those who did not make returns for the year 1918 should request the Collector of Internal Revenue, Omaha, Nebr., to send a blank on which to make return. Those who made returns in 1918 will be mailed returns, but should one not be received by January 10, 1920, write the Collector to send you one.

The law contemplates that taxpayers make their own income tax returns. If you want assistance, you should avail yourself of the services of the income tax man when he is in your vicinity.

Make your return at the earliest date possible as you may find it inconvenient to do so later. The Internal Revenue Department can render greater and more efficient service if taxpayers will act promptly and prepare their figures in advance. If you want an income tax man to help you make out your return have your figures and books of account with you. It will save you time.

### ORDINANCE NO. 272

An Ordinance establishing a curb line on Box Butte Avenue, and Third Street in the City of Alliance, Nebraska, and repealing Section 1 of Ordinance No. 247 of the City of Alliance, Nebraska.

Be it ordained by the Mayor and Council of the City of Alliance, Nebraska:

Section 1. That the curb line on either side of Box Butte Avenue in said city shall be thirty-four feet from the center of said street, and that the curb line on either side of Third Street in said city shall be thirty-six feet from the center of said street.

Section 2. That Section 2 of Ordinance No. 247 of the City of Alliance, Nebraska, entitled "An Ordinance establishing a Curb Line on all Streets in the City of Alliance, Nebraska, and repealing Ordinance No. 197 of the City of Alliance, Nebraska," and all other ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with the terms hereof are hereby repealed.

Section 3. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage, approval, and publication according to law.

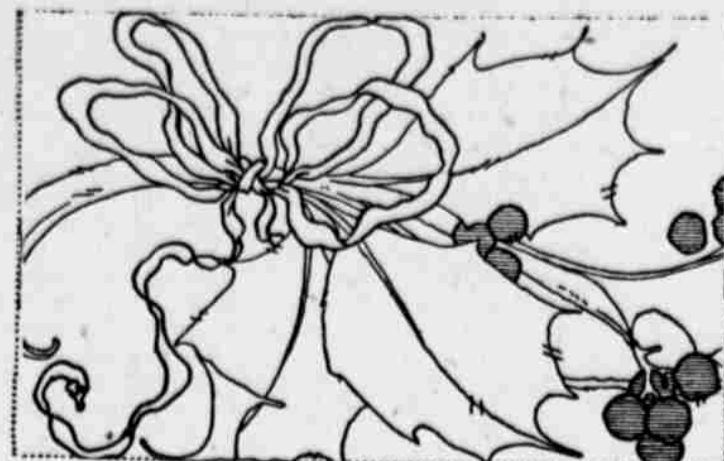
