ter there are, to be sure, but they are few and far between; and the summers, with their cool nights, are delightful. The water, a point inevitably to be considered, is of such a quality that there could be no improvement desired by the most exacting. It comes from the city's own deep wells. The water and electric light plants are municipally owned.

Alliance and Box Butte county constitute a mutual admiration society. Alliance is proud of the little empire of which she is the capital, but her pride is no whit less than thatofthecounty in its metropolis. East and south of the city is the sand hill country, the most wonderful cattle section of the nation; and to the west and north stretch the acres of rich chocolate loam which has made this section a synonym for productivity.

The three banks, which are members of the Community club—the First National, Alliance National and First State—show by their huge deposits and their constantly expanding operations that this section is progressing in great strides so far as material affairs are concerned.

Few towns of its size in the United States possesses a commercial organization which is so alert, aggressive and effective as the Community club. This circumstance is due to the fact that its membership is made up of more than a hundred genuine specimens of "live wires"-business and professional men who are on their toes, ready to go, whenever the call comes to be up and doing. They accord their organization something more than - financial support, although they give that quite eiblrally; but in addition they give it their active, vigorour aid whenever there is work to be done. As directors of the organization, they have installed for t'e present year's work the following nine leading spirits; Glen Miller, J. W. Guthrie, Charles Brittan, J. S. Rhein, F. A. Bald, A. T. Lunn, W. J. Mahaffy, E. D. Mallery, L. H. Highland. The organization considers nothing of too little importance to handle, nor is it awed, on the other hand, by the unusual magnitude of any undertaking. Its activities extend all the way from the purchase of cocoons from the children of the city at a penny a dozen to the fostering of the \$1,500,-000 packing plant and the \$100,000 home-building corporation previously referred to. Both of these enterprises are the direct result of the Community club's work.
