To facilitate this undertakpared covering the different phases of the work in order to classify realts from the standpoint of the en ployer as well as the employed. There is evidently an effort, also, to check up the relative value of the work accomplished by the social agencies.

Information is asked concerning he number of ex-service men seeking employment and the number for whom employment was found during the past year; the estimated number still out of work and the number of disabled men eligible but not yet approved by the federal board for vocational education.

Aside from the need of this information to complete its annual report, there is evidently a desire on the part of the war department to use this experience in furthering its efforts to re-establish the discharged soldier.

Suggestions and recommendations are requested, as well as the prompt co-operation of those in charge of the work. Members of the Red Cross among the ex-service men and others through whom information is available can be of great assistance to the local chapter in complying with the government's request for this report. If you can give the home service bureau of Alliance any information on ex-service men who are out of work or on men who should apply for compensation because of some disease or disability acquired in or aggravated by their military service, we shall appreciate it very greatly.
