

PROVISION FOR SOLDIER DEAD BURIED IN FRANCE

Bodies of all American Soldiers whose relatives consent to their permanent burial in France will be interred either in cemeteries under the jurisdiction and care of the United States government or in French burying grounds, as the next of kin directs. In the cases of those left in French cemeteries the relatives of the dead will be expected to assume in the future the responsibility for the care of the graves, for payment for the perpetual concession—that is, the permanent resting places of the bodies—and for all other charges for maintenance.

The bodies that are to remain in France will be transferred from French to American cemeteries at the expense of the United States government. The object of removing the bodies from where they now rest is to concentrate them in American cemeteries so as to simplify the care of the graves. This policy in no wise affects the present plan of returning to the United States the bodies of those whose relatives wish that course to be followed.
