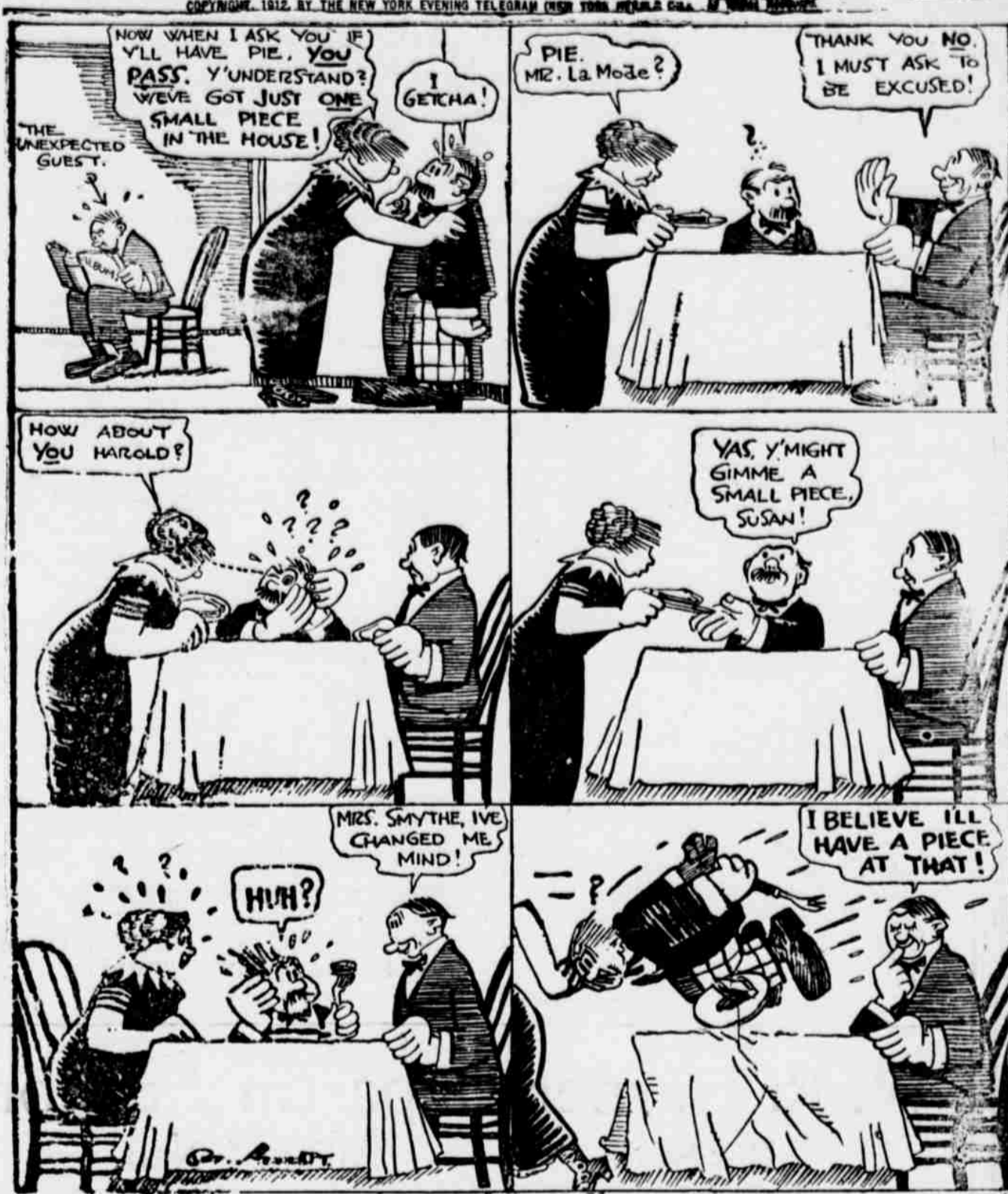


# WHEN A MAN'S MARRIED
