Mrs. Claud McDonald arrived Friday morning from Chicago on a business trip. While here she will visit her father, Mr. Atchison.

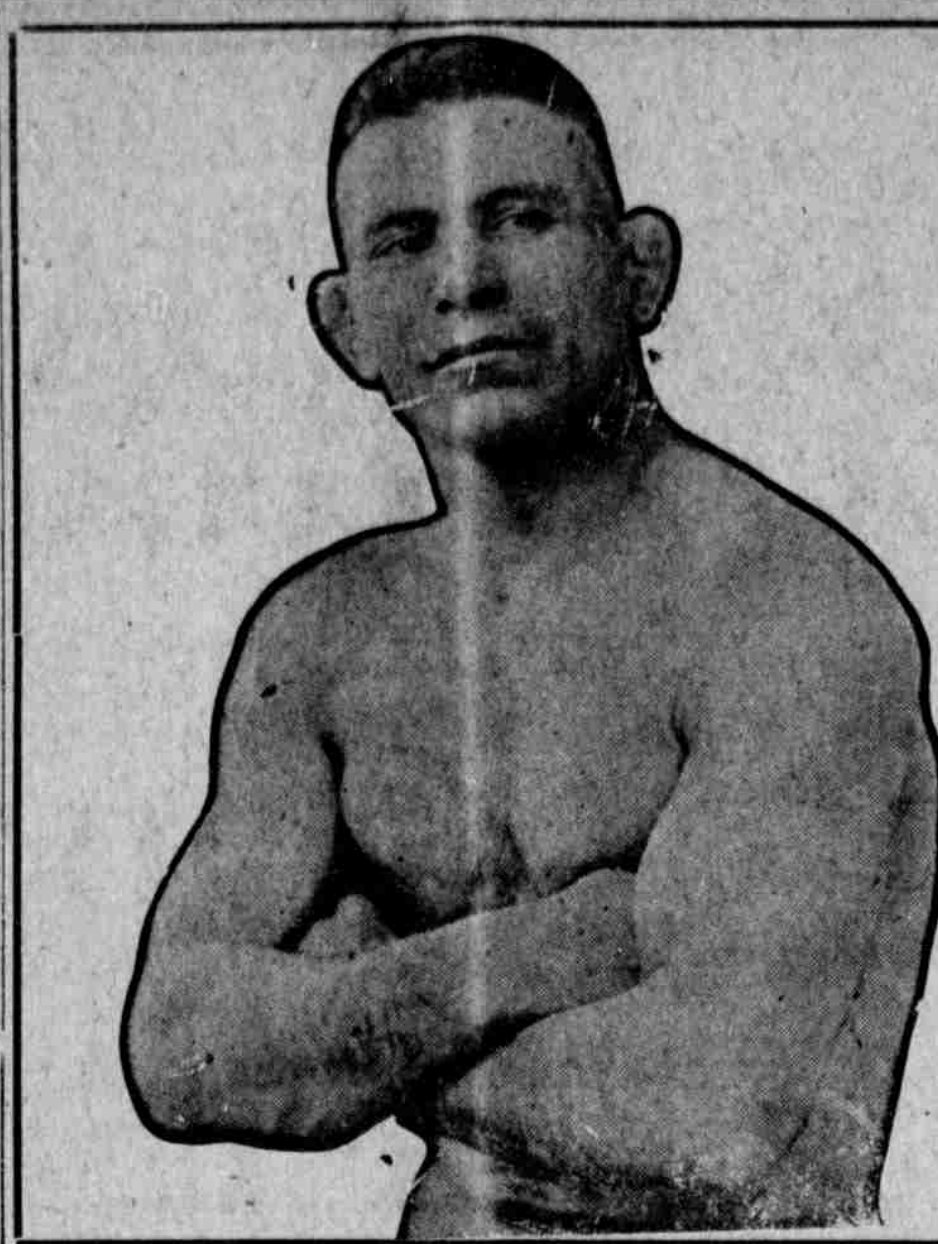
