Hay and Feed.
 Hay receipts light in eastern markets; heavy in west. Trend of market downward. Prices declined the week but a few have reacted from the low point. Cincinnati still congested. Good demand for best hay noted at Minneapolis and Omaha. Quoted, Feb. 16 No. 1 Timothy New York \$35, Philadelphia \$24, Cincinnati \$23, Chicago \$23.50, Minneapolis \$20, Memphis \$29, Kansas City \$18.50. No. 1 Alfalfa Kansas City \$19.50, Memphis \$27, Omaha \$19. No. 1 Prairie Minneapolis \$15, Kansas City \$13, Omaha \$10.
 Wheatfeed market slightly improved; linseed and cottonseed meal remain dull and in light demand. Alfalfa meal and beet pulp quiet. Hominy feed and catfeed quoted higher. Gluten feed unchanged. Weather conditions restricting demand. Stocks in all sections reported as normal or larger than normal. Cottonseed stocks at mills about 7,000 tons larger on January 31 than last year, insuring sufficient production from now on to equal that of last year. Feed prices in general barely holding steady. Quoted bran \$20.50, middlings \$20, flour middlings \$24, Minneapolis; linseed meal \$36 Minneapolis, \$42 Cincinnati; 36 per cent cottonseed meal \$26.50 Memphis, \$33 Chicago, \$35.50 northeastern markets; white hominy feed \$22 St. Louis, \$26 Cincinnati, \$30 Atlanta; No. 1 Alfalfa meal \$19.50 Kansas City, 21 St. Louis; Gluten feed \$35 Chicago, \$28 Cincinnati; beet pulp \$33 New York.

Minneapolis reports flour demand dull; wheat milling demand fair.
