Barnes, deceased.

The petitioner further states that more than two years have elapsed since the death of the said Mattie M. Live Stock and Meats.

Prices of practically all classes of live stock at Chicago advanced during the week those of sheep and lamb leading. Yearling wethers up \$1.50-\$2; fat lambs \$1.75-\$1.85; feeding lambs \$1; fat ewes \$1-\$1.15 per 100 lbs. Beef steers up 5c-6c; butcher cattle 2c-5c. Feeder steers quoted 5c-\$1 higher; hogs advanced 5c-25c per 100 lbs. better weights gaining most. Feb. 23 Chicago prices: Hogs, bulk of sales, \$9.20-\$10; medium and good beef steers \$8.65-\$10.25; butcher cows and heifers \$4.25-\$9.40; feeder steers \$7.25-\$9; light and medium weight veal calves \$9.50-\$12.75; fat lambs \$7-\$8.25; feeding lambs \$7.75-\$10.75; yearlings \$6.50-\$8.25; fat ewes \$4.25-\$6.25.

Eastern wholesale fresh meat prices: beef and lamb up \$1-\$2; pork loins \$2-\$4; veal and mutton generally \$1 higher per 100 lbs. February 23 prices good grade meats: beef \$14-\$16.50; veal \$18-\$21; lamb \$18-\$21; mutton \$11-\$14; light pork loins \$22-\$24; heavy loins \$16-\$20.

Hay and Feed.

Hay: Colder weather causing slightly improved demand. Receipts very light except at Kansas City and at Omaha. Timothy prices up about 50c. Alfalfa unchanged except at Memphis where it is \$2 lower. Prairie down \$2.50 Kansas City, unchanged Minneapolis and Omaha. Low grades almost unsalable. Demand only equal to present light receipts in principal markets. Quote No. 1 timothy New York \$31.50; Cincinnati \$23.50; Chicago \$24; Minneapolis \$19.50; Kansas City \$19. No. 1 Alfalfa: Kansas City \$19.50; Omaha \$19; Memphis \$27. No. 1 prairie: Minneapolis \$15.50; Kansas City \$11.50; Omaha \$10.50.

Grain.

At the opening of the week's trading larger movement, small demand and lack of export trade caused price declines, but these losses were more than recovered on the 19th and 21st under resumption of export business, small county offerings, slow milling demand and a decrease in the visible supply of both wheat and corn. On the 23rd the market was unsettled and prices fluctuated rapidly within a narrow range. Sentiment is mixed with no strong incentives for either buying or selling. In Chicago cash market No. 2 Red winter wheat 15c-20c over March; No. 2 hard 3c-5c over; No. 3 mixed corn 4c under May; yellow, same. In Minneapolis No. 2 dark 11c-20c over Minneapolis March. Kansas City reports export demand fair, milling demand good. No. 2 hard 5 1/2c over Kansas City March. Closing prices: Chicago March wheat \$1.71 1/2; May corn, 7 1/4c. Minneapolis March wheat \$1.57 1/2; Kansas City, March \$1.61 1/2; Winnipeg, May \$1.86 1/2; Chicago May wheat \$1.61 1/2. Net price changes for week only fractional.

Fruits and Vegetables.

Sacked round white potatoes strengthened 5c-10c per 100 lbs. f.o.b. northern shipping stations, reaching 90c-95c Chicago car-lot market 25c-30c, closing \$1.20-\$1.30 sacked. Round whites showed further weakness at western New York shipping points, reaching 90c-95c. New York market week at \$1.10-\$1.25 bulk.
