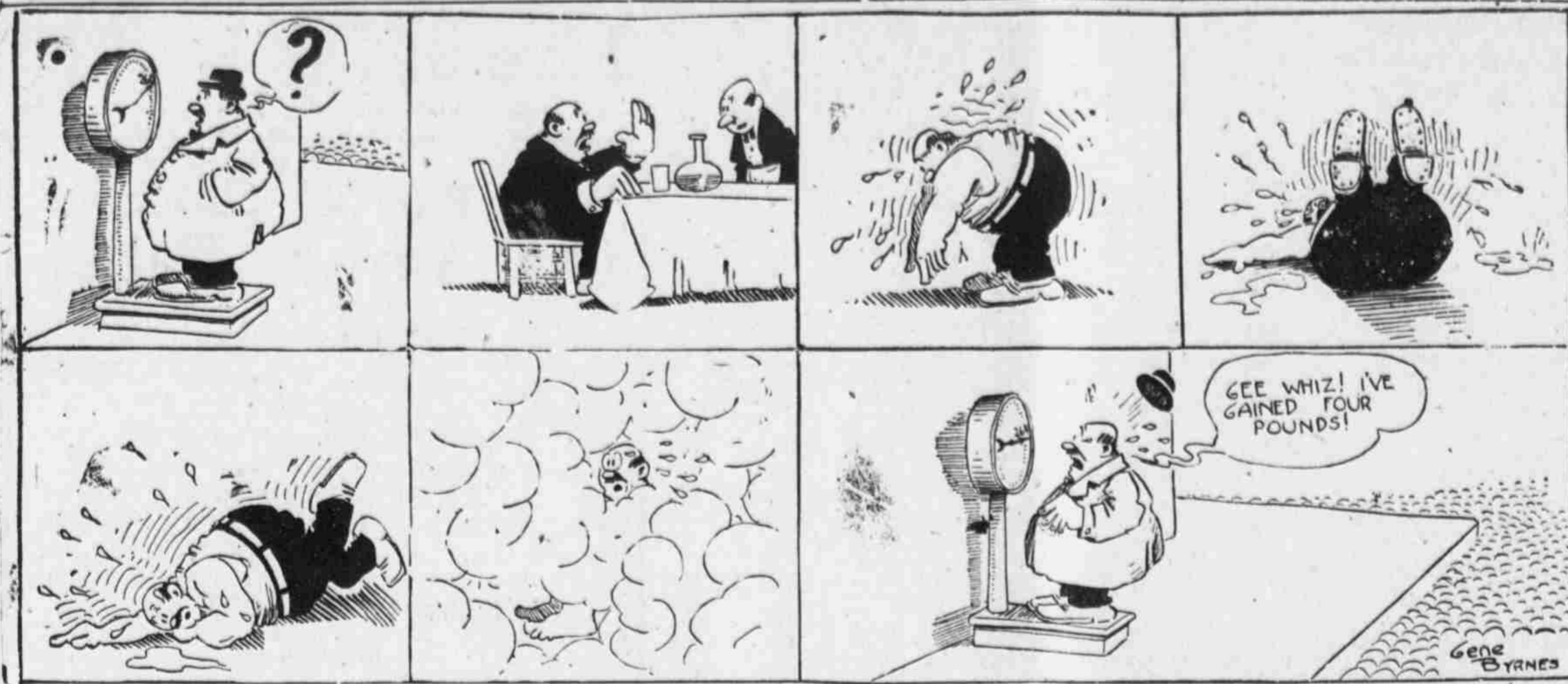

WEEKLY MARKETGRAM

(U. S. Bureau of Market)

Grain.

Market unsettled the past week easily influenced and prices fluctuated rapidly. On declines there were liquidation of coarse grains for country account and good export demand. On the 6th reports of wet and freezing weather and much colder weather forecast caused a rally from low point but prices declined again at the close. Secretary Wallace's statement that the supply of farm products on hand far exceed present demand was given bearish construction in grain trade. In Chicago cash market No. 2 red winter wheat 6c-9c over Chicago May; No. 2 hard 11c-13c over; No. 3 mixed corn 4 $\frac{1}{2}$ c under Chicago May; No. 3 yellow 3c-4 $\frac{1}{2}$ c under. For the week Chicago May wheat down 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ c at 1.36 $\frac{1}{2}$; May corn 3 $\frac{1}{2}$ c at 59 $\frac{1}{2}$; Minneapolis May wheat down 4 $\frac{1}{2}$ c at 1.28 $\frac{1}{2}$; Kansas City May 3 $\frac{1}{2}$ c at 1.27 $\frac{1}{2}$; Winnipeg May 6 $\frac{1}{2}$ c at 1.65 $\frac{1}{2}$. Minneapolis flour demand dull; wheat demand good. Kansas City wheat demand fair. No. 2 hard 13c over Kansas City May.

Live Stock and Meats.

Chicago live stock prices changed only slightly during the week. Hogs ranged from 5c lower to 25c higher per 100 pounds, light hogs showing the decline. Beef steers steady to 40c lower; cows and heifers down 25c. Feeder steers and veal calves practically unchanged. Fat lambs steady to 25c higher; feeding lambs steady to 50c lower. Fat ewes unchanged. April 6th Chicago prices: hogs, bulk of sales, \$8.75-\$10; medium and good beef steers \$8-\$9.40; butcher cows and heifers \$4.50-\$9; feeder steers \$7.25-\$9; light and medium weight veal calves \$7-\$9.50; fat lambs \$7.75-\$10; feeding lambs \$7.50-\$8.75; yearlings \$7.25-\$9; fat ewes \$5-\$6.75.

Eastern wholesale fresh meat prices also changed but slightly. Beef, veal and mutton, about steady. Lamb and pork loins steady to 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ higher. April 6th prices on good grade meats: beef \$16-\$17.50; veal \$17-\$20; lamb \$18-\$23; mutton \$12-\$16; light pork loins, \$25-\$28; heavy loins \$18-\$23.

Hay.

Most hay markets depressed, unsettled and generally easier. Baltimore prices off \$2 per ton. Receipts in eastern markets continue heavier than in western markets. Prairie receipts increasing in Chicago but demand decreasing. Majority of arrivals in Chicago of low grade; trade not in as hot as last week; prices, which are \$1-\$2 lower than on the 2d, for nearly all grades and kinds. Few shipping inquiries. Midland and low grade practically unsalable in Minneapolis. Kansas City and southeastern markets easier. Receipts in western markets adequate to meet present demand. Quoted: No. 1 timothy \$22 at Cincinnati; \$19 at Minneapolis; \$19 at Kansas City; \$30.50 New York; \$24.50 at Philadelphia; \$27 at Memphis; No. 2 timothy: \$19 at Cincinnati; \$17.50 at Minneapolis; \$28.50 at New York; \$23.50 at Philadelphia; \$24 at Memphis; No. 1 alfalfa: \$18 at Cincinnati; \$17 at Minneapolis; \$18 at Kansas City; \$27 at Memphis; No. 1 prairie: \$15 at Minneapolis; \$13 at Kansas City.

Feed.

Practically all feeds quoted lower; demand unimproved. Offerings fair for early shipment but there is considerable pressure to sell for deferred shipment. Speculative buying has dwindled as distributing trade is well stocked and not disposed to make bids.

Fruits and Vegetables.

Potato prices down 5c-15c at northern shipping stations, closing 75c-95c per 100 pounds sacked. Chicago carlot market at low level, down 10c at 90c-\$1. New York round whites held at \$1.40-\$1.50 bulk, New York. Florida No. 1 Spalding Rose in double head barrels closed lower at \$10.50-\$11 at Chicago; \$7-\$7.50 at New York. Texas Bliss Triumphs \$9-\$9.50 per 100 lbs. Kansas City; \$8 St. Louis. Movement of white potatoes increased rapidly during the week ended April 5th.

Dairy Products.

Butter markets recovered steadily throughout week until the sixth when sharp breaks occurred and the prices dropped in all markets. Heaviest declines averaging 2 cents were in the east. Weakness attributed to temporary surplus although at Chicago weakness is apparent reflection of drop at New York. Closing prices 32 score: New York 49 $\frac{1}{2}$; Chicago 48 $\frac{1}{2}$; Philadelphia 50; Boston 50 $\frac{1}{2}$ c. Danish butter at New York selling at close to domestic prices.
