### WEEKLY MARKETGRAM

(U. S. Bureau of Markets)

#### Hay.

The hay market continues dull and inactive. Only better grades find ready sale. Receipts light but equal limited demand which is principally local in most markets. Prices steady on top grades. No. 1 Timothy quoted \$30 a New York; \$21 Philadelphia; \$19 Minneapolis; \$20 Atlanta; \$26.50 Memphis; No. 1 alfalfa: \$20 Omaha; \$20 Kansas City; \$26 Memphis; \$32 Atlanta. No. 1 prairie: \$15.50 Minneapolis; \$4.50 Kansas City; \$12.50 Omaha.

#### Feed.

Market continues drabby. Eastern markets not following stronger feeling manifested by western mills. Linseed meal up \$2 at \$33 Minneapolis because of better demand and limited production; quoted \$39 Philadelphia; \$37.50 Kansas City. Cottonseed meal up 50c Memphis at \$25; quoted: \$30 Kansas City. Spring bran quoted \$23.50 Philadelphia; \$25.50 New York; \$16 Minneapolis; spring middlings \$15 Minneapolis; \$22 Philadelphia; grey short \$18.50 Kansas City; \$22.50 Memphis; alfalfa meal \$18 Kansas City.

#### Fruits and Vegetables.

Sacked round white potatoes weakened slightly at northern shipping points closing 70c-80c per 100 pounds Chicago car-lot market held at 90c-\$1 New York round whites down 15c New York city at \$1.10-\$1.25 bulk. Florida No. 1 Spaulding Rose in double head barrels down 75c Chicago at \$7.25-\$7.50; down 75c-\$1 per barrel New York at \$7.25-\$7.50. Texas sacked Bliss Triumphs weakened slightly at Kansas City at \$6.50. Total potato movement 2,820 cars week ended April 19 compared with 2,837 cars preceding week.

New York cold storage A2 1/2 Baldwin apples firm in leading wholesale markets at \$5.50-\$6.25 per barrel; Chicago up \$1-\$1.25 per barrel at \$6-\$6.50. Northwestern extra fancy Winesaps medium to large sizes up about 25c per box Chicago at \$2.75-\$3.75, small sizes \$2-\$2.50. Boxed apple movement week ended April 19 was 141 cars compared with 210 cars preceding week; barreled apples 322 cars compared with 308 cars. Southern Klondike strawberries 25c 27c per quart Baltimore; 30c-35c New York and Philadelphia; 40c-50c Boston.

#### Grain.

Prices continued to decline the opening day of the week's business but on the 15th settlement of British strike and good export business started an upturn that was given impetus by passage of tariff bill in house and reports of freezing weather and blizzard in winter wheat belt. Prices eased off on the 18th and 19th account limited buying power. Liberal offerings in outside markets and weakness in Winnipeg market as result of liquidating and rushing wheat into United States before tariff bill becomes law, but there was a sharp advance on the 20th due to general change in sentiment. Exporters after cash corn and on the 20th took 350,000 bushels at 1 1/2-2c above delivery basis. Country offerings light; domestic demand moderate. May corn strong as result higher premiums cash wheat and reports indicating some deterioration growing crop southwest caused by the recent India wheat crop reported poor with indication 90 million to 100 million bushels less than a year ago. In Chi-

cago cash market No. 2 red winter wheat \$1.35 1/2, No. 2 hard \$1.38 1/2, No. 3 mixed corn 57 1/2c, No. 3 yellow 58 1/2c, No. 3 white oats 38 1/2c. For the week Chicago May wheat up three cents at \$1.25 1/2; May corn 4 1/2 at 59 1/2c. Minneapolis May wheat up three cents at \$1.19 1/2; Kansas City May three cents at \$1.16 1/2; Winnipeg May three cents at \$1.55. Kansas City milling demand fair, export demand slow, No. 2 hard \$1.33 1/2.

#### Live Stock and Meats.

Chicago hog prices ranged from 5c-25c lower on medium and light weight and 15c-25c higher on heavies the past week. Beef and feeder steers generally steady; butcher cows and heifers tending to 25c higher. Fat lambs up \$1-\$1.25 per 100 pounds.

#### Dairy Products.

Butter markets very irregular the past week with general price tendency downward—92 score butter now 46c New York; 45c Chicago; 47 1/2c Philadelphia; 47c Boston. Receivers desire to keep stocks cleaned up and have kept market nervous. California butter in fairly liberal quantities; Danish butter also available on eastern markets.
