The recent announcement of Andrew Weiss, superintendent of the North Platte reclamation project of the federal government, that the sey will provide irrigation water to every service.

Guernsey. The supply of water for you irrigation through these canals is stored in the Pathfinder dam south of day Casper and many miles above Guernsey. This water, when needed for irrightion, is released from the Path-finder and goes down the river bed un-til diverted into the canals. The Path-finder dam stores sufficient water to irrigate thousands of acres of addi-tional lands and there should be sufficient to cover Box Butte county with plenty of water during the irrigating season.

The Guernsey dam will be a high one and will act as a storage, power and diversion dam, three in one. The elevation of its site is over 5,000 feet, which is at least 1,000 feet higher than that of Alliance and Box Butte county, making the problem of canals a comparatively easy one because of the heavy fall in the distance of approximately ninety miles to be traversed.

A meeting of the governors of a number of western states is to be held in Salt Lake City on July 8, for the purpose of conferring with government representatives on federal irri-gation projects for which funds are to be supplied by the government. Water is Found in **Oil Well at Ardmore**

According to the Ardmore American the people of that city were disap-pointed to learn on Wednesday that the oil well, which has been drilling there "on and off" for several years had penetrated the Lakota sandstone, in which they hoped to find oil, and found water instead. It is stated that the well may be made into a good water supply well for the town, which will be beneficial, as Ardmore has always been short on good water.

The American also said:
