ORDINANCE NO. 319.

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR
THE ASSESSMENT AND COL-
LECTION OF A TAX UPON ALL
TAXABLE PROPERTY WITHIN
SEWER DISTRICT NUMBER 11
IN THE CITY OF ALLIANCE, NE-
BRASKA, FOR THE PURPOSE OF
PAYING FOR THE CONSTRU-
TION AND EXPENSE THAT HAS
BEEN INCURRED IN PUTTING
IN SEWER MAINS TO SERVE
THE PROPERTY WITHIN SUCH
SEWER DISTRICT.

WHEREAS Sewers have been built
to serve the property included in
Sewer District 11 in the City of Alli-
ance, Nebraska, according to the pro-
cedure provided by law, and

WHEREAS Special benefits accrue
to property in the district abutting
upon and adjacent to the lines of said
sewers, and

WHEREAS The cost of said work is
found to be \$3,199.59;

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE
MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE
CITY OF ALLIANCE, NEBRASKA:

Section 1. That this Council sitting as
a Board of Equalization for this
purpose, after due notice as by law
provided, and after due consideration
of all facts, find, determine and fix
the total special benefits in said districts
resulting from said improvement to be
equal to the cost of the work, which is
\$3,199.59; and further find, determine,
equalize and fix the special benefits to,
and, in pursuance of such action and
conclusion, hereby levy special assess-
ments upon the real estate, lots, parcels
and pieces of land included in said
districts as follows, to-wit: The descrip-
tion of the property being written
on the left and the front footage and
the amount assessed against such prop-
erty to the right thereof, as follows:

Section 2. Said special assessments
shall be and they are hereby made a
lien on said real property from and af-
ter this date, and they shall become
due and delinquent as follows, to-wit:
One-fifth of said respective sums shall
become due and be delinquent in fifty
days from this date; one-fifth in one
year from this date; one-fifth in two
years from this date; one-fifth in three
years from this date, and one-fifth in
four years from this date. Each of
these installments, except the first
shall draw interest at the rate of seven
per cent per annum from this date
until become respectively delinquent,
and all of said installments shall draw
interest after they become respectively
delinquent, at the rate of one per cent
per month until paid: Provided that

the owner of any one of the above
described tracts of real estate may pay
the whole amount of the special as-
sessment thereon within fifty days
from this date without interest, and
thereupon such tract shall become and
be exempt from the operation of this
lien.

Section 3. All such assessments shall
be placed on the tax roll for collection
as a separate tax, in addition to the
tax for general revenue purposes, sub-
ject to the same penalties and collect-
ed in like manner as other city taxes.

Section 4. This ordinance shall be
in full force and effect upon its pas-
sage, approval and publication accord-
ing to law.

**Friends Are Boosting
Moses P. Kinkaid for
United States Senator**

According to reports at the state
house a "persistent rumor" in the
western part of the state has it that
Congressman Moses P. Kinkaid of the
big Sixth district may decide to run
for United States senator, an office
that R. B. Howell of Omaha desires to
fill, says the State Journal. The per-
sistent rumor is that friends of the
congressman feel that he is entitled to
promotion at the end of his twentieth
year of service in congress and it
would be a proper thing for him to
round out his score of years in that
body by quitting the house of repre-
sentatives forever and try for the of-
fice of senator. If he should fail to
gain the goal nothing would be lost
and he would end his service in con-
gress in a blaze of glory and might
then retire from politics with an hon-
orable record to his credit.

Some of this talk, but not all of it,
is said to come from republicans who
are suspected of casting longing eyes
upon the congressional position now
held by Mr. Kinkaid. For years too
numerous to mention, men with as-
pirations have longed for the retire-
ment of Congressman Kinkaid so that
they might be clear for others.
Men in both the republican and demo-
cratic parties have made no secret of
this longing. No one has been able to
defeat him and he will close his twen-
tieth year in the house at the end of
his present term. To be able to run
for senator, it is pointed out, that he
need not resign, but merely quit run-
ning for representative and switch
over to the office of senator and take
chance on that new venture.

Those who are circulating this "per-
sistent rumor" are aware of the over-
cautiousness for which Congressman
Kinkaid is famed, and they are of the
opinion he will at least sound well his
district on this subject before he
makes a decision. The "persistent
rumor" promises him a big vote in the
Sixth district and in Omaha where the
opposition to Mr. Howell for senator
has its headquarters.

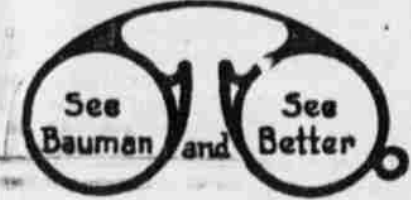
