

**City Manager's Corner**

The material for the water extension was ordered through Newberry's Hardware company, they having the lowest quotations. This material should begin to arrive about August 15 at which time we hope to begin on it. This extension will consist as follows:

640 feet of 6 inch main on Mississippi avenue from 7th to 9th street in Belmont addition with a hydrant on the northeast corner of the intersection. 780 feet of 4 inch pipe from 8th to 10th street on Yellowstone and Missouri avenues. 750 feet of 6 inch pip on 10th street from Yellowstone to Mississippi avenue. 700 feet of 4 inch on 4th street in Duncan's addition or what is commonly known as an extension of Missouri avenue from 10th to 12th street with hydrants at 12th and 10th streets. At some future date the 6 inch main on 10th street will connect with the 8 inch main on Box Butte avenue and later be extended south on Mississippi avenue to connect with the 6 inch mentioned above and also 6 inch will then later run along the south side of Belmont addition. There will also be later a 6 inch main on 8th avenue between Missouri and Mississippi avenues making the complete loop around these streets.

Mr. Kelly of the Kelly Well company of Grand Island was here and approved the work we had done on the Kelly well. He is shipping us a pump today from Bellevue, Nebraska, and we will do our best to make a real well of this, although Mr. Kelly does not know just what he can do on this in view of the fact that they were not as well versed on putting down wells in fine sand at the time they put this well down but since then they have had considerable experience and know how to put them down and keep out the fine sand. However, he is going to do his best to regain this well if possible.

We have repaired the roof at the power plant and gone all over it with a coat of tar and gravel and put it in good shape so that we should have no trouble with this leaking for a number of years.
