

### Commissioners Put In Ten Days' Hard Work at August Meeting

The Box Butte county commissioners finished up a ten-day session late Thursday afternoon of last week, and the official record, compiled by County Clerk Avis Joder, shows an enormous amount of work transacted. The session began on August 16 and ended August 25. August 18 the board sat as the board of equalization, and on that day completed the making of the county levy and certified the levies from the state, various school districts, the city of Alliance and village of Hemingford.

The first two days of the session was spent in viewing roads and in auditing and approving a big batch of claims on the state highway funds. The bond of L. A. Berry as justice of the peace was approved. August 20 the board began working on a big bunch of claims, and approving them. There were claims on the general, road, road dragging and bridge funds. The balance of the session was taken up with the consideration of claims. Commissioner Carrell was absent the first day of the meeting, but all three commissioners were on hand for the rest of the long session.

The official record for August 18, showing the various tax levies, follows:

The Board of County Commissioners met as a Board of Equalization, pursuant to adjournment. Members present, Geo. W. Duncan, chairman, C. L. Hashman, Geo. Carrell, John Pilkington, assessor and Avis M. Joder, clerk. The following proceedings were had and done, to-wit:

The Board of County Commissioners now having been in session as a Board of Equalization not more than twenty days and not less than three days and having disposed of all complaints relative to assessment that have come before them, and is appearing that the State Board of Equalization is satisfied with the assessment as returned by the County Assessor, as per returns of the State Board of Equalization, which certifies the total valuation of Box Butte county to be \$15,274,853.00.

The State Board of Equalization certifies that the following rate of State Tax was determined and levied by said Board for the year 1921 on the total valuation for Box Butte county:

per 100 lbs. under the effect of accumulating supplies, has operated to greatly reduce this shipping of immature stock, and digging of matured stock has been slowed up by the rains of the past week.

The field station for the dissemination of market news on potatoes, maintained by the marketing bureaus of the Federal and State Departments of Agriculture respectively, was opened at Alliance August 25. Daily bulletins of information concerning potato shipments and prices at shipping points and terminal markets will be issued from this office for the next three months and mailed free to a list of some 1,200 growers and dealers who have made application for the service.

### Sheriff Miller and His Friends Perpetrate a Hoax at Convention

According to the Omaha newspaper, Sheriff Jim Miller was one of four men to perpetrate a hoax on the delegates to the convention of the state sheriffs' association, which met at North Platte last week. On Saturday afternoon, Sheriff Miller, in company with Sheriff Duffy of Holt county, Sheriff Flitcraft of Red Willow and a deputy from North Platte, held up the Clinton jewelry store at North Platte and secured \$500 in cash and several hundred dollars worth of jewelry.

The fake robbery followed a discussion among the delegates as to the ease with which a robbery could be perpetrated. Taking only a few men into their confidence, the four men masked themselves and in broad daylight, at the point of revolvers, staged a desperate holdup. The owner of the store and the clerks were not in on the joke.

The sheriffs in convention organized a posse and gave chase. Had not the engine of the car stalled, the fake robbers would have got away with it. Half an hour after the robbery the culprits were captured in a meadow a few miles from the city, and the explanation was made that it was all part of the program of the convention. The officers took a long chance on getting shot, but didn't mind the risk at all.
