More Spud Raisers Interested in the Certified Seed Game

Applications for certification of seed potatoes in Nebraska covered 1408 acres this year, which is nearly double the acreage entered last year, according to H. O. Werner, state potato specialist. The second field inspection, just completed, brings the qualified acreage down to 775, and the third and final inspection, to be made in the bin sometime in October, may eliminate the equivalent of 125 acres, leaving 650 acres, or about 60,000 bushels of certified seed for market. The total certified of the 1920 crop was 22,000 bushels.

All but 50 acres of the fields under observation for certification this year are Bliss Triumphs, grown mostly for southern shipment. Only fields in dry-land territory are considered, and 45 per cent of the acreage is in Box Butte County.

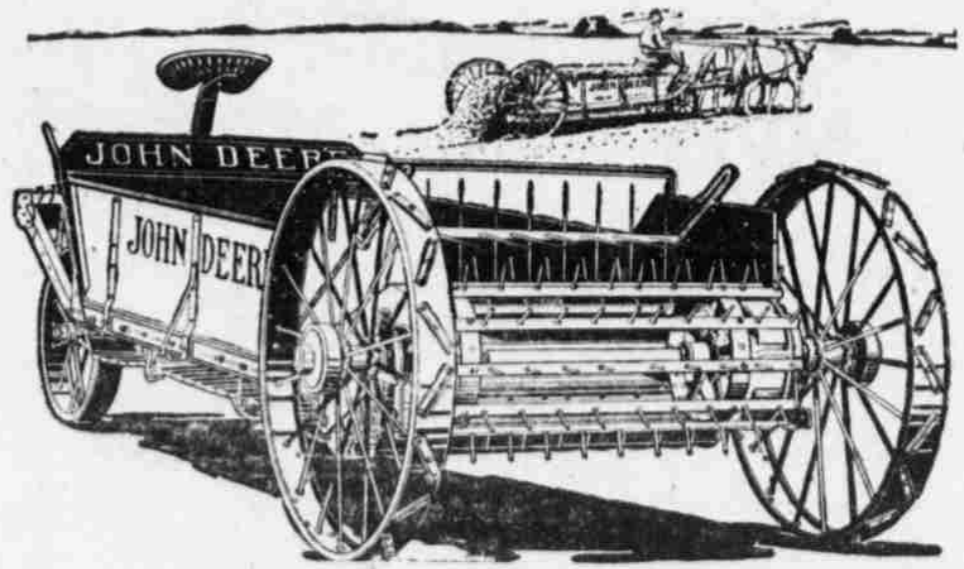
