Third Series of County Baseball Held on Sunday

The games of this week in the county league will help to get a line on the comparative strength of the teams. Snake Creek, one of the leaders playing at Ash Grove, a team previously defeated by Berea, the other top liner. Pleasant Hill and Fairview, two teams tied for the cellar position, will battle, to see which maintains this. Berea will play Marple, and should not have any great opposition, although the Marple team is not to be lightly taken, as is shown by previous scores. The Red Sox and Lawn will also play off a tie in standing, both of these teams having lost one and won one. All of the games will be hard fought, as the cellar teams are trying hard to rise, while the headliners will naturally not have the same view. Should both Berea and Snake Creek win, the game between these two on May 21, will be watched with interest, as it will decide the question of leadership. These teams are by no means certain of winning however, as there are a number of teams that have designs on the championship cup which do not include a victory for either of the leaders.

Journal Predicts Close Competition in State Track Meet

The State Journal in an article concerning prospects for the state track meet, mentioning Alliance as one of the leading contenders. The Journal says: With twenty-five high school track teams having entered the first part of the forty teams and a new record in number of schools and participants in the interscholastic track and field championship meet at the University of Nebraska on Saturday, are seen by Henry F. Schulte, head track coach at the Cornhusker institution. Schools that had entered the forefront of the week included Alliance, Broken Bow, Harvard, Cambridge, Clay Center, Friend, Beatrice, Omaha central, Omaha commerce, Tecumseh, Hastings, Havelock, Crete, Waverly, DeWitt, Comstock, Callaway, Columbus, Tobias, Wilber, Dodge, Gothenburg, Cook, Osceola and Aurora.

As a large number of these teams already have proven themselves the class of their respective districts, a few of them setting records in dual and county meets, plenty of thrills and some display of exceptional form should be an order for the day—providing it is a favorable one. Alliance, champions of the western Nebraska schools, emerged from last week's meet with a total of fifty points, closely followed by Morrill with a total of 45½ points. From a field of seven teams, Hastings high won the Hastings college invitation meet, although Rhodes, of Ansley, individual hero at the Broken Bow meet, also carried off personal honors at Hastings. Ansley won the Custer county meet and is expected to register with the state meet officials as an entry.

Omaha Central won the city championship over Commerce, South and Benson in a quadrangular meet, and will have a strong team in the tournament. Broken Bow won the Kearney normal district meet; Tecumseh the southeastern Nebraska meet, and Callaway the Seven Valleys meet.

The Fillmore county championship rests with Geneva after a comparatively easy skirmish with lesser lights from community centers. York high won the county meet in its own county, with Faoster also winning individual honors. Five teams were entered. Gothenburg had little difficulty in taking the Dawson county meet, piling up 75 points. Wilber, group two champions in the 1921 state meet, will enter Saturday.

Alliance Placed in Group Two at the State Meet

The classifications of teams entered in the twentieth annual Nebraska interscholastic track and field championships, scheduled for next Saturday on the state university athletic field in Lincoln, were announced. Additional entries received pushed the total number of schools entered to thirty-six. A few additional entrants are expected. Following are the team classifications:

Group three—Lincoln, Beatrice, Omaha Central, Omaha Commerce, Hastings, Grand Island, Columbus, Fremont, North Platte, Superior and University Place.

Group two—Aurora, Alliance, Ansley, Broken Bow, Cambridge, Clay Center, Crete, Friend, Gothenburg, Havelock, Harvard, McCook, Morrill, Nebraska City, Osceola, Plattsmouth, Tecumseh, Wahoo and Wilber.

Group one—Waverly, DeWitt, Calloway, Comstock, Mead and Dodge. Classification of track teams in the state meet is a matter of enrollment. Group one comprises all schools that have an enrollment for this year of under 100. Schools with an enrollment between 100 and 275 comprise group two. Those schools which have more than 275 enrollment are placed in group three.

More than three hundred athletes will compete in the track carnival. Coach Henry F. Schulte announced Wednesday that probably 350 track athletes from Nebraska high schools would be in Lincoln Saturday for the big meet.
