German Editor Killed. CINCINNATI, Jan. 28.—A special announced the death of an unidentified minister, falling from a train near Detroit. The strange case has been identified as Rev. Henry Liebhart, D. D. He was assistant editor of The Christian Apost with the late venerable Dr. Nagel from 1864 to 1872.

St. Louis Jan. 28.—Judge Caldwell has ordered the receivers of the Lombard Investment company of Kansas City, who filed their first accounting, not to receive or disburse any money from or to mortgagees after the next 30 days and instructed mortgagees to pay money direct to owners or agents.

De Giers Died Peacefully. ST. PETERSBURG, Jan. 28.—The immediate cause of the death of M. De Giers, the minister of foreign affairs, was angina pectoris, complicated by inflammation of the lungs.

Miss Bartells Gets a Verdict. MEXICO, Mo., Jan. 28.—The jury in the sensational Bartells-Martark breach of promise case returned a verdict awarding Miss Bartells \$3,000.

Strikers Accept a Compromise. PROVIDENCE, Jan. 28.—At a meeting of the striking employees of the British Hosiery company at Thornton the proposition of the manager that as a compromise they accept a 10 per cent wage with a guarantee of steady employment until July, was accepted and the eight weeks strike is ended.

Wealthy Stockman Murdered. EVANSTON, Wyo., Jan. 28.—Harvey Booth, one of the wealthiest cattlemen in Wyoming, was found murdered in his stable. He has been in the stock business in the Big Horn and Uintah counties for more than 20 years.

Got Her Bill Through the House. DENVER, Jan. 28.—The house passed the bill raising the age of consent for girls from 16 to 21. This bill was introduced by Mrs. Holly, representative from Pueblo, who is receiving much praise for her successful efforts in the face of strong opposition.

Eight Thousand Thrown Out. WILKESBARRE, Pa., Jan. 28.—All the colliers of the Wilkesbarre Coal company will be idle during this week. Eight thousand men will be without employment. Superintendent Lowell says the coal trade was never known to be so dull.

He Fed Soft Coal to His Hogs. EGIN, Ills., Jan. 28.—M. A. Eddy, a farmer living near Sycamore, read in his farm paper that soft coal, ground fine, was a good thing to mix with feed for hogs. He tried it and has 60 dead hogs.

Killed by a Train. PITTSBURG, Jan. 28.—John Snyder and Bridget Murphy were run over and killed at Conterville by a Baltimore and Ohio train while they were crossing the track. They were horribly mangled.

Quail and Four Apples a Day. DECATUR, Ind., Jan. 28.—A. J. French of Lima Grove, this county, has begun a 90-day fast. He made a wager of \$75 that he could subsist on a quail and four apples a day for 90 days.

Fitzsimmons Goes to Syracuse. ST. LOUIS, Jan. 28.—Bob Fitzsimmons has gone to Syracuse, N. Y., to answer to the charge of killing King Ford. His trial will occur about Feb. 4.

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LITIGATION IS ENDED. Ex-Treasurer Kifer Reimburses Woodbury County For Shortage. CRIMINAL ACTIONS STAND. Cases Against the Board of Supervisors Are Set for Trial in February—County Saves Ten Thousand Dollars by the Settlement.

ST. LOUIS, Jan. 28.—The settlement that the county board of supervisors of Woodbury county have just effected with the citizens and taxpayers' committee marks the end of some of the most bitterly contested litigations ever instituted in court. About a year ago a newspaper published an abstract of county warrants issued to members of the board of supervisors, all of which were receipted for by someone or another of the members of the board.

St. Louis, Jan. 28.—While standing in the drug store of Charles Ryder W. T. Borton discharged one chamber of a revolver into his breast, producing death in a few moments. As he fell he exclaimed: "I have killed myself accidentally." He was well known and wealthiest real estate dealer in this part of the state and a member of one of the leading families.

St. Louis, Jan. 28.—The train from Louisville arrived last night minus the combination mail and baggage car. The car caught fire about 70 miles east of St. Louis from an overheated stove and was entirely destroyed.

Missouri Murderers Resisted. JEFFERSON CITY, Mo., Jan. 28.—Governor Stone granted a respite to Henry Kaiser and Jacob Heinze, who were under sentence to be hanged in St. Louis Jan. 31. The respite is until Feb. 21. This is the second time these men have been given a new lease of life.

Altgeld Their Choice. ST. LOUIS, Jan. 28.—The statement is made by one of the most prominent labor leaders in the United States that the positively preferred, A. Universal overcast, belonging to the train crew, and all of the baggage and mail were burned except one registered letter mail pouch, which was thrown out by Clerk Dolnel. The car was detached and abandoned.
